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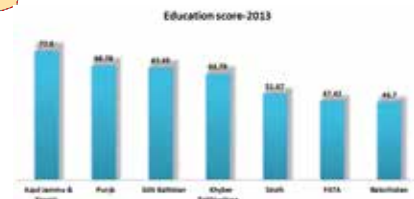
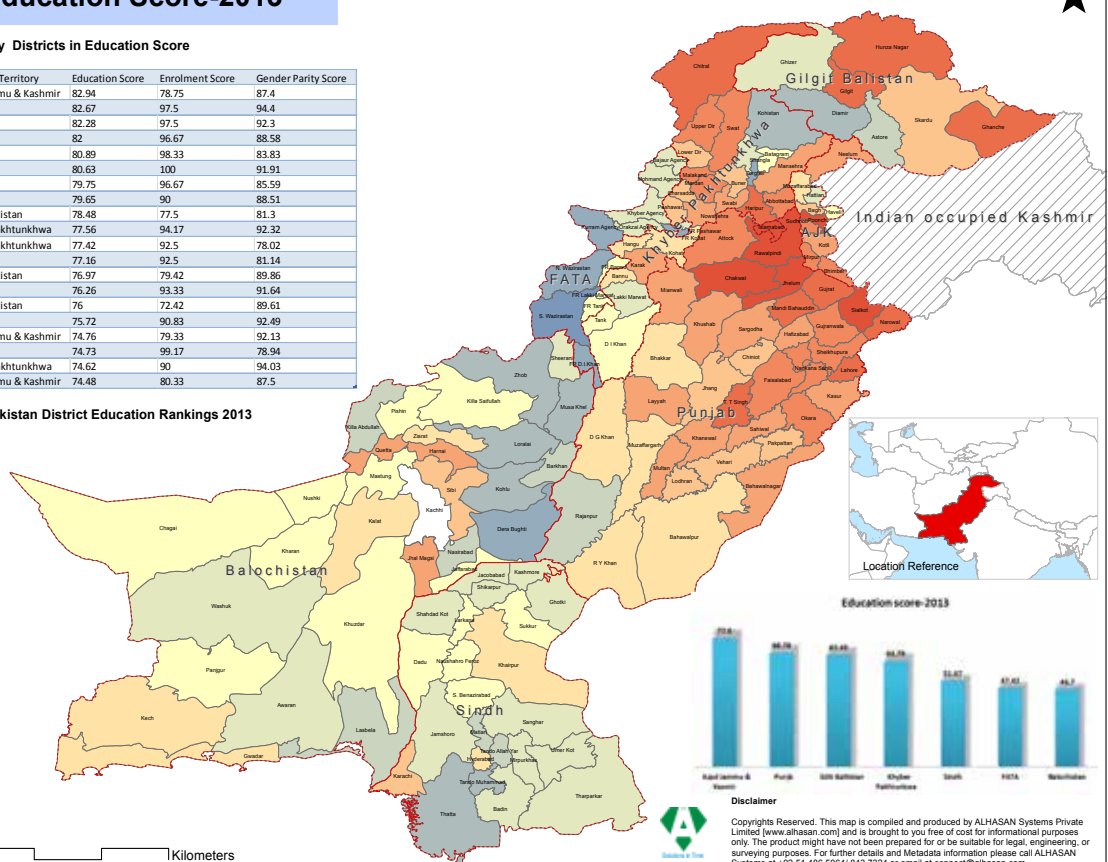
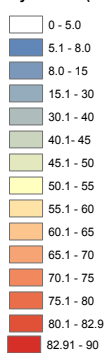

Education Score By District (In %)



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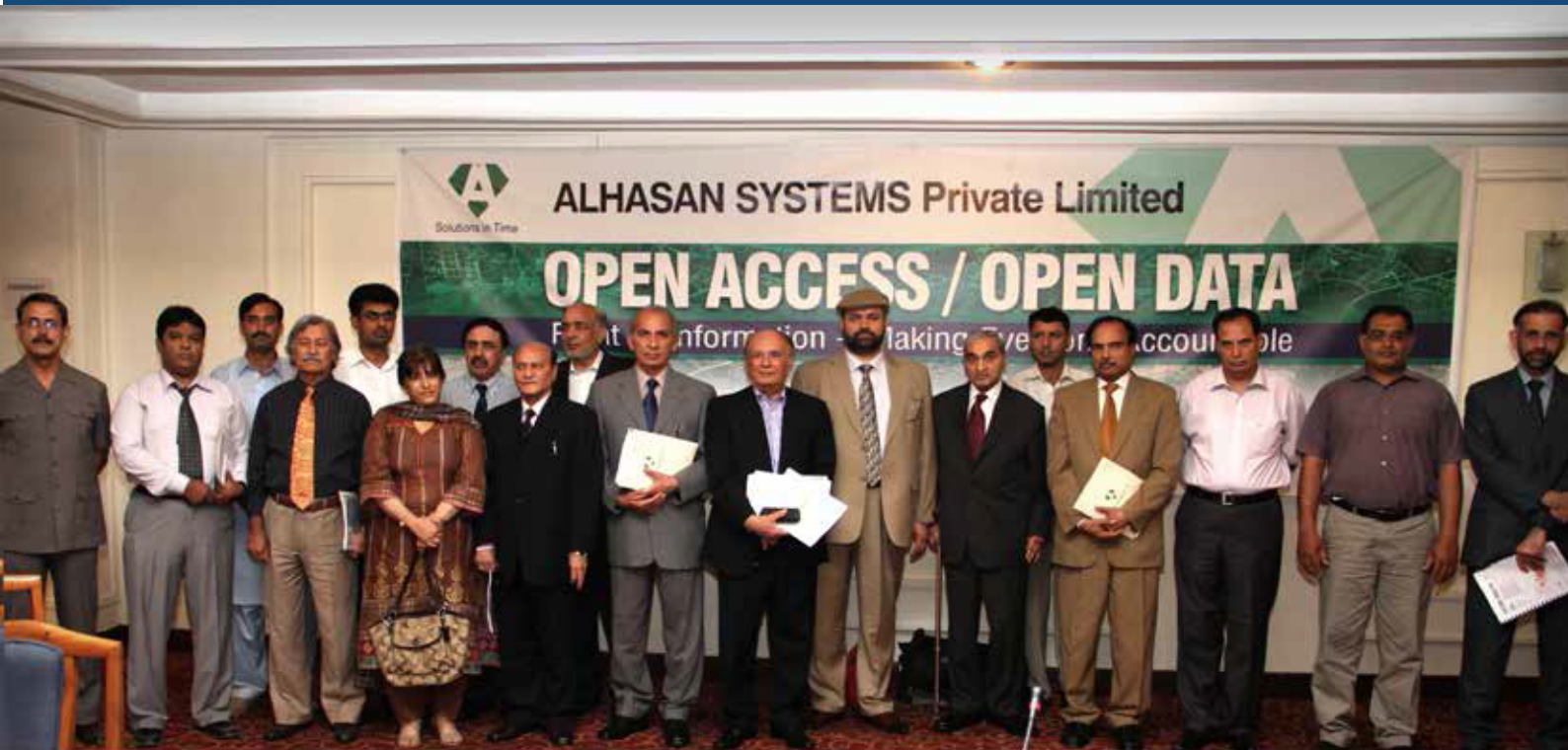

UNITED NATIONS: Malala Yousufzai became the first signatory of a new worldwide petition calling for urgent action to ensure the right of every child to safely attend school. The petition was launched on Monday with the backing of the United Nations Special Envoy for Education. Malala, 15, is expected to be honoured at a ceremony at the world body's headquarters on July 12. It will be her first public appearance since she was shot last year by extremists, said a UN press release. The launch came in the wake of an attack on a bus in Quetta that killed 14 girl students, said Special Envoy Gordon Brown in an article published in the Huffington Post. "This, the bloodiest atrocity yet in escalating violence against female students, comes eight months after the attempted assassination of Malala and her two friends, Kainat and Shazia, targeted by terrorists just because they wanted to go to school," Mr Brown wrote. "That is why today, in advance of Malala Day on July 12, we are launching our worldwide petition to demand that global leaders ensure 57 million out-of-school girls and boys are given the chance of education," he said.

Malala's appearance at the UN headquarters on July 12 will mark her first major public speech since she was shot last October. She will be joined at the UN by hundreds of young people from around the world. The petition and the UN event are part of an effort to establish universal primary education by December 2015, the deadline for the Millennium Development Goals, a set of anti-poverty targets set by the UN member states in a 2000 summit. In a video statement issued for the petition launch, Malala said the terrorists involved in the recent attack on girl students, which UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon condemned over the weekend, were "cowards." "The innocent girls who died on Saturday have nothing to do with politics and only wanted to empower themselves through education. Obtaining education is every man and woman's birthright and no one is allowed to take away this right from them," she stressed.

LAHORE: The Federation of All Pakistan Universities' Academic Staff Associations (FAPUASA) has said taxation proposals on education in the 2013-14 budget may reverse recent improvements in higher education. The government is to introduce a five per cent tax on tuition fees exceeding Rs200,000 a year. "This is unfair to public universities as the fees are set by the government ... This will benefit private universities as they can keep the fee at Rs190,000 to avoid the tax," said FAPUASA Secretary General Dr Jamil Ahmad Chitrali at the Punjab University Executive Club on Saturday.

He also condemned a new tax on lab equipment. "The chemicals used in the chemistry labs, for example, are imported," he said. "If USAID gives Rs10 million to build a new department, the university will have to pay tax. And above all the universities will have to pay tax on their endowment funds," he added. Another official said that universities were required to keep their endowment funds above a certain minimum level, after which they could not use it. By taxing them, the government might actually take the funds below the minimum level.

FAPUASA President Dr Ahsan Sharif said the tax rebate on teachers and researchers' salaries was an important financial incentive for them to work in Pakistan. "As a result of the policies introduced in 2001, at least seven public universities were recently assessed as being in the top 400 universities in the world, when not a single one was in the top 500 before 2002. Many teachers from abroad came to teach in Pakistan ... they will reconsider their decision and might go back," he said. The federation also demanded that the teachers' pay be increased by 30 per cent rather than 10 per cent.

ISLAMABAD: Within the last few years, out of the total 55 new university campuses, 31 have been established in rural areas throughout Pakistan. Higher Education Commission Chairperson Dr Javaid Laghari stated this in Swat while interacting with the vice chancellors of Khyber-Pakhtunkhwa's (K-P) public sector universities on Monday. "In K-P, 116 development projects worth more than Rs21 billion have been approved so far," said the chairperson. He said the HEC has awarded more than 1,960 indigenous and 1,200 foreign scholarships for the students of K-P. "Under faculty development programs, 682 PhD scholarships have been allocated for faculty members at various higher education institutions in the province," he said. Pakistan's first ever Earthquake Engineering Centre and Archaeological Conservation and Research Laboratory have been established at University of Engineering and Technology (UET) Peshawar and Hazara University, Mansehra respectively, he remarked.

Besides, Laghari said the other steps included the establishment of 15 Quality Enhancement Cells (QECs), five Offices of Innovation, Research and Commercialisation (ORIC), provision of video conferencing facility at 17 universities, and training of 2,830 faculty members. Recently, the degree attestation facility has also been provided at the HEC regional centre in Peshawar to facilitate residents of the province, he said. for bringing effective and vibrant reforms in higher education sector of Pakistan especially increasing access to higher education in remote and far-flung areas of country.

The bad news

However, things are not all rosy. According to HEC sources, the commission has demanded Rs17.8 billion for 125 ongoing projects and 28 new ones for the fiscal year for 2013-14. In the previous fiscal year, the government approved Rs 15.8 billion for 175 different projects, but Rs4.7 billion out of that has not been allocated yet. Sources further revealed that during the last six years, the government cut Rs24.84 billion from the announced Rs102.88 billion in allocations. After this gruelling gap between announcements and releases, the HEC feared that universities in Rahim Yar Khan, Swat, Dir, Mansehra, Gilgit, Bahawalpur, Shikarpur, Turbat, Loralai and other remote areas could face closure. Laghari expressed hope to The Express Tribune that the new government would not create hurdles in the autonomy of HEC and will allocate the required funding in time to save the future of higher education in the country.

The vice chancellors of public sector universities, especially of the newly-established universities in far-flung areas, have expressed great concern. They believe that they would not be able to pay staff salaries, with some public sector university representatives having said that their universities have even borrowed money from banks on the basis of the government commitment that funds would be released soon. "Delays and cuts in the funds can cause a real trouble for all the universities as we will not be able to even pay professors and other employees," said Sakhawat Hussain Shah, the VC of Hazara University. According to sources, the delay in the release of development budget has created adverse effects on more than 150 ongoing projects and about 6,000 scholars, both indigenous and foreign. The HEC has not paid salaries to more than 110 foreign professors hired by various public sector universities.

Pakistan is a country starved of educational facilities at every level, from the primary and most basic to universities and higher education generally. Successive governments have failed to prioritise the educational needs of the nation and the poverty of the education system matches the poverty of the common man. It now emerges that the last government has left as many as 40 universities, many of them in far-flung areas and established in the last five years, in desperate financial straits. Not only did the last government cut the allocation for higher education, it also rejected a staggering 95 percent of development projects presented by the universities – a major contribution to their spiral of decline. They struggle to pay their staff salaries, are unable to fund research or equip laboratories and libraries and some run the risk of closure in the near future. If that happens opportunity will be snatched from the grasp of young people in places as far apart as Gilgit, Swat, Bahawalnagar and Rahim Yar Khan, making a travesty of any promise that was made.

Eight percent of the population of Pakistan has access to higher education compared to 12 percent in Bangladesh and 18 percent in India. During the last tenure 72 public sector universities made requests for allocations of 350 development projects none of which were beyond the bounds of being perfectly reasonable, but 334 were turned down and 16 approved. Funds that should have been used to bolster the higher education sector were diverted for political reasons, with former PM Raja Pervaiz Ashraf directing billions away from the universities for his pet road-building projects. Over five years the PPP government allocated Rs87.08 billion for higher education but only released Rs66.94 billion. Standards set by the UN recommend that the budget for higher education should not be less than a quarter of the total budget. In Pakistan it is less than one-tenth. Pakistan now has a new prime minister who has a lot on his plate. The power crisis may be paramount but the education crisis runs it a close second. The country needs to hear a loud, clear and unequivocal message from PM Nawaz Sharif – there must be education for all, no more raiding of education budgets and a lifeline thrown to our universities before we start losing them.

transition of power from one democratically elected government to the next is a momentous landmark. The people's will is clear and their expectations are great," he said.

He said that this is the moment to chart a new future. "This week I have met with and heard clearly the new government's commitment to improve economic stability, increase the tax base, and generate growth. We look forward to hearing more on these in the upcoming budget." He said UK will work closely with all political parties to deliver results on education, maternal health, and creating jobs and growth. "This will help millions of people in Pakistan to lift themselves out of poverty and give them a brighter future." Pakistan is set to become the UK 's largest recipient of development investment. However, this increase is dependent on securing value for money and results, and linked to reform at both the federal and provincial levels. This includes taking steps to build a more dynamic economy, strengthen the country's tax base, and tackle corruption. Education is the UK 's top priority in Pakistan. Over the coming years, the UK plans to work in partnership with Pakistan to support four million children in school, recruit and train tens of thousands of new teachers, construct or rebuild more than 20,000 classrooms and improve test results in core subjects. Other priorities for the UK include preventing some 3,600 mothers dying in childbirth; enable half-a-million couples to choose when and how many children they have; providing practical job training (such as car mechanics, cooks, weavers, carpenters, etc) to tens of thousands of people living in poverty, and enable millions of others to access financial services such as micro finance loans so they can earn more money and lift their families out of poverty.

PESHAWAR: US Consul General Robert Reed on Monday congratulated 100 students for successfully completing the US-sponsored English Access Microscholarship Program. More than 400 Khyber-Pakhtunkhwa (K-P) students benefited from these scholarships. "English has become the language of business and education throughout the world. However, it can be difficult for many students to find opportunities to learn English," said Reed at the award ceremony. "The English Access Program helps students overcome this challenge. We are proud to partner with the Peace Education and Development (PEAD) Foundation to invest in Pakistan's youth." PEAD collaborated with the US Consulate to select students from local madrassas and hired local teachers to lead the classes. Pakistan boasts the largest Access program in the world with over 5,000 students studying English in locations across the country.

The shooting of Malala Yousufzai made front-page news around the world last year, and the after-effects of that include the attention of several important and famous figures on the state of female education in Pakistan. In April this year, film star Angelina Jolie initiated a fund for school girls' education in Pakistan. The first grant will provide funding for forty girls in the country. But Jolie is not the only one to have shown interest – last week, pop icon and music legend Madonna pledged money for expanding a school in a poverty-stricken area outside Karachi. The school is run by young Humeira Bachal, and is reportedly the only school (public or private) in that locality. Jolie and Madonna are just a few examples of the outpouring of celebrity support Malala has received. Other celebrities have often taken up different philanthropic causes around the world – Actor Sean Penn has also raised a voice for flood relief efforts in Pakistan.

Many, however, criticise such efforts, highlighting that the hype around celebrity support isn't necessarily accompanied by sincere efforts to eradicate poverty or address a particular social issue. Other criticisms include that such announcement of philanthropy serves more as 'good PR' for the celebrities rather than the cause itself. On the other hand, it can be argued that the more famous a person associated with a charitable cause, the more likely it is that their endorsement will attract funding. The publicity that comes with celebrities can lead to more money for a cause as well as its efficient execution in a transparent manner. Do you think celebrity endorsement contributes positively to philanthropic causes? Or is the enlistment of people like Jolie and Madonna merely a way to boost their own publicity with little substantial improvement happening on the ground in the countries where they've pledged support?

FAISALABAD: The Education Department has decided to initiate a survey of all schools in the district, to identify ghost schools. Spokesman of the EDO Education, Muhammad Naeem, told media on Saturday that they had received many complaints regarding ghost schools in the district. Teachers at these schools received salaries even though there were no students there, he said. Naeem said the teachers would send the Education Department fake reports about students enrolled in these schools. Considering these complaints, the Education Department has decided to conduct a comprehensive survey of schools in the district. He said, "23 assistant education officers have been assigned the task to conduct the survey from June 3 (Monday)."

He said, "The team will collect details regarding the location, student enrolment, education level and buildings of all private and public schools in the district." Survey of primary, middle, secondary

and higher secondary schools will be conducted separately and unregistered schools will be sealed, he said. The survey would help eliminate the problem of ghost schools. The data from the surveys will also be uploaded on the Education Department's website, he said.

Lahore: The top 400 students from disadvantaged households in the country would be provided quality higher education, under an agreement signed between the Lahore University of Management Sciences (LUMS) and the United Kingdom government, here on Thursday. The Empowerment through Education Initiative would help alleviate poverty through quality education, allowing students to land better jobs. George Turkington, the head of the Department for International Development, UK, said, "Entrenched poverty is denying opportunities to millions of people and undermining Pakistan's long term stability and prosperity." He said, "The UK believes education is the key to transforming Pakistan's future...we will work to support some four million children in school in Pakistan by 2015. We look forward to working closely with LUMS over the coming years." Dr Adil Najam, the LUMS vice chancellor, said that he believed the initiative had the potential to transform for Pakistan as a whole.

"This is a truly strategic investment because it will directly impact the lives of the best and the brightest of Pakistan, not only in terms of the students who are supported, but also all the others around them," he said. The five-year programme will be managed by LUMS and would support students who would otherwise be unable to afford quality higher education, for undergraduate and graduate degrees. It will target impoverished regions of the country and will have a special focus on girls.

Classrooms without Classes

Islamabad" The national flag sways proudly with the direction of the wind, perched atop Federal Model School for Boys in Mal village, near the Bahria Enclave. From afar, it looks like school is in session during the afternoon. And yet, a closer inspection reveals that the school is starkly deserted: there is not a student in sight. There are no tell-tale signs outside but, clearly, this is a ghost school. "Our teachers told us that the school was being closed down because of an insufficient number of students," says a second grader, Ali*. "I miss it." Clearly, even the scenic Islamabad is no exception to the phenomenon of ghost schools. Like thousands of others in the country, this school is not functioning and yet, four teachers continue to draw salaries. With the gates now firmly closed for education, the building is being used by the housing society.

What's in a ghost school?

The top court recently intervened on the basis of media reports and ordered district judges to conduct a survey to identify the ghost schools, a murky task unto itself. While stating its limits for intervention, the Supreme Court observed during the hearing of suo motu case that a ghost school can be defined an infrastructure built for school purposes which now houses animals in courtyards and classrooms. These schools today are residences, stables or offices of private or official departments, including those of the police and Rangers. Teachers continue to draw salaries, while the buildings remain occupied by those other than students.

A country-wide epidemic

In Khyber-Pakhtunkhwa alone, there are 28,510 schools, out of which over 3,000 have been destroyed or damaged because of militancy, military operations and floods, since 2001. "We left our homes in a hurry when the security forces launched an operation against the militants," says Issa*, a resident of Behrain, a small town in Swat. "My 10-year-old son was distraught at having to leave the house without his books and schoolbag." A teacher reveals that although she has been drawing the salary of a primary school teacher for a decade, she does not even know the location of the school she is supposedly employed by. In a similar vein, Sindh, historically known for its peaceful and tolerant culture, has been badly affected by ghost schools. Many locals blame the waderas, who want to curb human development in their districts, in a bid to keep their influence intact.

When asked about this menace, residents of Jacobabad do not say much. Instead, they furtively show pictures of a man severely beaten up by the local wadera when he helped a judicial team identify a ghost school in the area. A top office bearer of the Sindh Rural Development Society revealed that in the rural district of Matiari alone, over 60,000 children are not going to school. In Balochistan, the situation is worse, in many ways. Official records indicate that this province birthed the phenomenon. Although only 36 out of the total 12,388 schools have been identified as ghost schools by the provincial education department, experts claim this figure is grossly misleading, especially when considering the law and order situation. Punjab is also plagued. Out of 58,000 schools, over 266 are occupied for purposes other than education. According to the secretary of Punjab's education department, the deplorable situation can largely be blamed on the

lack of planning. He says there are 460, not 266, ghost schools, but rather than addressing the issue, authorities keep shifting the onus of responsibility onto the shoulders of others.

Jarring statistics,

According to collaborative report published by the UN and the Pakistani government last year, nearly half of all primary schoolchildren and nearly three quarters of young girls are not enrolled in schools. Currently, Pakistan's spending on education is less than 2.5 % of GDP — only nine countries in the world spend less than that on education. Further still,

Addressing the issue

In line with the promises for an overhaul of the education system, a mammoth task before the newly-elected government is to make the thousands of ghost schools functional. But the manifestos of major political parties—Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz, Pakistan Peoples Party and Pakistan Tehrik-e-Insaf— have failed to address the issue altogether. Aurya Maqbool Jan, a high-level education officer in Punjab, believes that in many cases, funds were allocated for construction of schools without proper assessment. Now, a comprehensive census is required to determine the exact scenario. Imran Masood, the former education minister in Punjab, agrees with Jan. These experts claim that government schools are easy targets for encroachers — the lack of ownership makes them vulnerable and up-for-grabs by those involved with illegal activities, or influentials of the area. "The functioning of the closed and destroyed schools will be a top priority of the newly elected provincial government," says Sirajul Haq, the designated-finance minister in new K-P government. Others, too, are optimistic. Fazalullah Pechcho, a secretary of the education department of Sindh, says that efforts are underway to retrieve such schools. "277 schools have been retrieved this year and they are now functional," he claims. "More will be done soon." "Names have been changed to protect identity

including fundamental as well as technical analysis, banking services, leasing, insurance and various corporate matters as applicable in Pakistan. The "Campus Outreach Programme" has received an overwhelming acclamation from various blocs of the societies. The programme is launched under the broader Financial Literacy Initiative by the LSE in collaboration with South Asian Federation of Exchange (SAFE). Campus Outreach Program – FLI is neither intended to promote or publicise any particular type of investment or product, nor is it aimed to endorse any specific kind of financial institution or market. Financial experts believe this program of LSE would go a long way in strengthening the investment mechanism and winning the trust of national investors.

ISLAMABAD: May 28: A civil society organisation on Tuesday said there was an urgent need to improve government schools across the country so that a maximum number of children can get quality education instead of joining the army of unskilled labour force as they grow up. "Most of the government officials claim that the quality of education in the government schools is up to the standard," said Anis Gilani of the Society for Protection of the Rights of the Child (Sparc). "But if you take a look, you will find their own children studying in private schools." He said even NGOs were not looking at things in a broader perspective as most of them only took up the project of improving 1-2 schools and that too as long as the donors sponsored them. Mr Gilani was speaking at the launch of Sparc's annual report 'The state of Pakistan's children 2012.' In the education sector, the report said Pakistan ranked second with the most out-of-school children in the world. According to the EFA Global Monitoring Report 2012, approximately one fourth of the 19.75 million children in Pakistan aged 5-9 were out of school.

The country reduced its spending on education from 2.6 per cent to 2.3 per cent of the GNP over the decade and ranked 113 among 120 countries on the Education Development Index. Among the provinces, Sindh allocated the highest amount – Rs111.9 billion – to the education sector. It was also the only province to pass legislation for free and compulsory education under Article 25-A of the Constitution. The report said though education was made free and compulsory in Balochistan, the act still needed to be notified by the incoming provincial assembly. Punjab has the highest NER (Net Enrolment Rate) for children in primary schools – 61 per cent – followed by Sindh 53 per cent, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa 51 per cent and Balochistan 47 per cent. Pakistan has the net enrolment ratio (NER) of 74.1 per cent for all the age groups enrolled either in primary, secondary or higher education. Progress has been slowest in low income countries, especially Pakistan, where only 15 per cent of children received pre-primary education in 2010. Pakistan has the lowest youth literacy rate – 70.7 per cent. Only 61 per cent of women in the country are literate compared to 79 per cent of males in the age group of 15-24 years. The report recommended that budgetary allocations for education should be consistently and substantially increased each year to meet the target of seven per cent of the GDP by 2015 as committed in the National Education Policy 2009. It was suggested that more technical and vocational institutes should be established to increase the capabilities of the disadvantaged children who had either dropped out or never attended school.

Presenting a report on child labour, Hamza Hassan, a researcher, said successive governments in Pakistan had failed to conduct a specialised child labour survey. "The first and only national survey undertaken so far estimated that there were 3.3 million child labourers in Pakistan in 1996." He said the picture was not clear due to the absence of an updated national survey on underage employment. Various international organisations have come up with different statistics about the prevalence of child labour in the country. The International Labour Organisation (ILO) estimates that the number of child labourers in Pakistan exceeded 12 million in 2012 while Unicef puts the number at 10 million. The report said employment of children in the domestic sector remained one of the most exploitative and invisible forms of child labour. The country is yet to sign and ratify ILO's Domestic Workers Convention. It was recommended that initiatives like the minimum wage policy and child labour-free model districts should be expanded and implemented effectively to provide relief to the child labourers.

In reply to questions, Sparc officials said there was a difference between child labour and child worker. Those learning skills like auto-mechanic etc., fall in the category of child worker. "But still if that master auto-mechanic is a literate person, it is more beneficial for him compared to a totally uneducated mechanic," said Zohair Waheed, one of the researchers. Mr Anis Gilani added that eradicating poverty would never finish child labour. However, abolishing child labour will eliminate poverty in the country. To prevent violence against children, Maheen Shaiq, the research officer of the NGO, said there was an urgent need to pass all the pending legislation on child protection, including Prohibition of Corporal Punishment Bill 2013, the Criminal Law Amendment Bill 2013

and the Child Marriage Restraint (Amendment) Act 2009.

FAISALABAD The Higher Education Commission in collaboration with the World Bank has approved scholarships worth Rs23 million for the students of the Government College University Faisalabad. Presiding over a meeting with the university's students' financial aid office, GCUF Vice Chancellor Zakir Hussain said that the aid would benefit more than 214 students. He lauded the efforts of the HEC for the promotion of higher education and said that it was due to the HEC's initiatives that more than 10,000 local and foreign scholarships had been provided to students across the country in the last 10 years. Dr Hussain said that student enrollments at universities across Pakistan had increased from 330,000 to over a million. Women students' enrollment at universities had increased from 36 per cent to 46 per cent, he said. Saima Perveen, in charge of the student's aid office, briefed the meeting about the scholarships and their disbursement. The GCUF financial aid office was set up in 2007 in collaboration with the Higher Education Commission.

Right to Education: 75 Primary School to be shut down

BAHAWALPUR: More than 5,000 children will be affected by the government's decision to shut down 75 primary schools in Cholistan by March 2014 due to a lack of funds. Cholistan Development Authority Deputy Director Muhammad Qamar Zaman on Saturday said seven schools had already closed down following budget cuts by the caretaker government. These include four in Rahim Yar Khan [Chak 258R, 156R, 153R and 1.2/240] and three in Bahawalpur [Chak 50D, 156DNB, and 128DNB]. "The remaining 68 would also close down by March 2014," he said. The schools were set up under the Rs57 million Literate Cholistan Project in 2009 for the promotion of education in the backward areas of Cholistan. Two teachers were hired for each school under the project. The responsibility for the school buildings was entrusted to the local communities. Zaman said, "In an area spread over 6,655,360 acres of land, there are only 21 government schools. All of them lack basic facilities." "It is astonishing that nobody has taken serious steps in this regard...there is no middle school here, public or private," he said.

He said as many as 50,000 children were deprived of education in Cholistan. Under the circumstances, Zaman said, the CDA schools were doing fairly well. "The results of primary class examinations in the last two-years were encouraging. This goes on to show that the children are interested in education," he said. In 2009, a summary recommending better salaries for the CDA school teachers was rejected by the government. As of now, the monthly salary of a senior teacher is Rs5,000, and that of a junior teacher is Rs2,500.

SMS based literacy program: Education may be a text message away

ISLAMABAD: For 1,500 women in Pakistan, an SMS message will soon be a tutor, textbook and school all rolled into one. On Wednesday, Mobilink Foundation — a nonprofit organisation established by Mobilink in 2007 — and UNESCO signed an agreement to enhance their "SMS-based Literacy" programme. The programme, which will now enter into a fourth phase, aims to educate 1,500 illiterate women in Punjab and Sindh using tutorials that will be sent via text messages in Urdu. At least 4,000 women have previously benefited from the same programme. In the latest phase, UNESCO has collaborated with government education departments and agencies to increase the project's outreach. As a result, 500 male students at 20 centres in the Federally Administered Tribal Areas and Khyber-Pakhtunkhwa will also be taking part. The six-month initiative will be managed under Mobilink Foundation's "mTaleem" scheme, which provides education to underprivileged communities across Pakistan.

Throughout the programme, the women, who will be selected by community-based nonprofit organisations, will be given basic training on how to use mobile phones and practical hands-on experience. The learning performance of the students will be tested using a special software developed by Mobilink. During this phase, learners at 20 centres, namely Multan, Sahiwal, Okara, Thatta, Jacobabad and Shaheed Benazirabad will be participating in the programme. The phase also includes UNESCO's initiative for the capacity building of rural female teachers, whereby 150 teachers in Islamabad will be trained about Early Childhood Education while 30 teachers in Multan, Sahiwal and Okara will learn about literacy and non-formal basic education.

UNESCO Islamabad Director Dr Kozue Kay Nagata said that the programme's novel approach, while developing interest among the learners would also safeguard them from relapsing into illiteracy. The mobile phones, however, contextualise the learning to suit modern day realities. The phones can be used for sending and receiving text messages in the future, thereby helping the women retain the basic language skills they have learnt, said Nagata. Incentives such as permanent ownership of the phone sets and free SMS from Mobilink for a fixed duration also fuel interest, she added. Mobilink Corporate Communications Head Omar Manzoor said the programme has also won the GSMA's Global Mobile Award in the "Connected Life Awards" category and was

acknowledged as the “Best Mobile Education or Learning Product or Service” in February this year.

ISLAMABAD: Commenting on the alarming state of education in Pakistan, Humayun said a meager Rs400 billion was being invested every fiscal year, with 95 per cent of funding coming from public coffers. Of this, 4.2 per cent were international donor grants.

Humayun said the authorities were displaying no urgency to address the issue, confirming that only two provinces had thus far enforced Article 25-A, which dictates that the state is responsible for ensuring all children aged five to 16 years receive their education. He added that the country spent 34 per cent of development assistance funds on higher education, 41 per cent on primary education and a paltry 1.8 per cent on secondary education. According to the Annual Status of Education Report 2012, the drop-out rate for students aged 14 to 16 in Punjab's schools was 18.5 per cent, while corresponding figures for Sindh, AJK, K-P and G-B and Fata were 19.7, 9.1, 11, 6.8 and 11.2 per cent respectively. The statistics clearly indicated that poor spending on secondary education was directly proportional to the worryingly high drop-out rates of students of this age-group across the country. “In the Musharraf era, Rs55 billion were allocated for education but only Rs9 billion were released,” said Consumer Rights Commission of Pakistan Programme Co-ordinator Rabia Shabbir.

Humayun took on the Danish School System, initiated by previous government of Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz in Punjab. “We can debate multiple policy options for it as they could have upgraded 660 schools from primary to middle,” he added. The lavish scheme cost Rs16,400 per student per month while student of the government cost only Rs 1,600 per month (national average), ED I-SAPS observed. Later, Riawana Shabbir, research fellow at I-SAPS also talked on budget tracking and its significance and techniques.

Higher education: Budget cuts put new varsities' future at risk

ISLAMABAD: Within the last few years, out of the total 55 new university campuses, 31 have been established in rural areas throughout Pakistan. Higher Education Commission Chairperson Dr Javaid Laghari stated this in Swat while interacting with the vice chancellors of Khyber-Pakhtunkhwa's (K-P) public sector universities on Monday. "In K-P, 116 development projects worth more than Rs21 billion have been approved so far," said the chairperson. He said the HEC has awarded more than 1,960 indigenous and 1,200 foreign scholarships for the students of K-P. "Under faculty development programs, 682 PhD scholarships have been allocated for faculty members at various higher education institutions in the province," he said. Pakistan's first ever Earthquake Engineering Centre and Archaeological Conservation and Research Laboratory have been established at University of Engineering and Technology (UET) Peshawar and Hazara University, Mansehra respectively, he remarked. Besides, Laghari said the other steps included the establishment of 15 Quality Enhancement Cells (QECs), five Offices of Innovation, Research and Commercialisation (ORIC), provision of video conferencing facility at 17 universities, and training of 2,830 faculty members. Recently, the degree attestation facility has also been provided at the HEC regional centre in Peshawar to facilitate residents of the province, he said. The vice chancellors lauded the contribution of HEC for bringing effective and vibrant reforms in higher education sector of Pakistan especially increasing access to higher education in remote and far-flung areas of country.

The bad news

However, things are not all rosy.

According to HEC sources, the commission has demanded Rs17.8 billion for 125 ongoing projects and 28 new ones for the fiscal year for 2013-14. In the previous fiscal year, the government approved Rs 15.8 billion for 175 different projects, but Rs4.7 billion out of that has not been allocated yet. Sources further revealed that during the last six years, the government cut Rs24.84 billion from the announced Rs102.88 billion in allocations. After this gruelling gap between announcements and releases, the HEC feared that universities in Rahim Yar Khan, Swat, Dir, Mansehra, Gilgit, Bahawalpur, Shikarpur, Turbat, Loralai and other remote areas could face closure. Laghari expressed hope to The Express Tribune that the new government would not create hurdles in the autonomy of HEC and will allocate the required funding in time to save the future of higher education in the country. The vice chancellors of public sector universities, especially of the newly-established universities in far-flung areas, have expressed great concern. They believe that they would not be able to pay staff salaries, with some public sector university representatives having said that their universities have even borrowed money from banks on the basis of the government commitment that funds would be released soon. "Delays and cuts in the funds can cause a real trouble for all the universities as we will not be able to even pay professors and other employees," said Sakhawat Hussain Shah, the VC of Hazara University. According to sources, the delay in the release of development budget has created adverse effects on more than 150 ongoing projects and about 6,000 scholars, both indigenous and foreign. The HEC has not paid salaries to more than 110 foreign professors hired by various public sector universities.

HEC to equip 600 govt colleges with broadband internet

The Higher Education Commission (HEC) has announced its plans to provide broadband internet connectivity to 600 government colleges across the country, reported Propakistani.pk on Tuesday. This plan will be executed by provincial governments, while the HEC will remain the core facilitator. Currently, there are 183 higher education institutions throughout the country with broadband internet connectivity. After this plan is implemented, students in Pakistan will have access to the HEC maintained digital library and archives. The Research Repository, containing more than 6,680 Pakistani PhD theses in digitised form, with a plagiarism eradication tool, has been provided to all Higher Education Institutes. Moreover, the HEC has established a computerised system of document attestation with more than 200,000 educational documents attested each year. Commenting on these achievements, HEC Chairman Dr Javaid R Laghari said universities are the most important producers of knowledge, which is the driving force for prosperity and improved standard of living. He said that video conferencing facility has been provided at 79 sites having footprints in 32 cities throughout the country. The video conferencing facility is not only being used for interactive meetings and lectures delivered under the Virtual Education Programme Pakistan, but it is being exhaustively utilised in the field of telemedicine and agriculture field research. So far, more than 2,554 academic activities, including workshops, presentations, PhD defense, and lectures have been covered through this innovative and modern facility.

Pakistan: a role model

Dr Laghari remarked that according to the World Economic Forum 2013, Pakistan's score on the higher education indicator of the Global Competitiveness Index surged significantly ahead, which is a clear manifestation and recognition of the fact that Pakistan's higher education sector has become a role model for the developing countries. Recently, the HEC and Ministry of Information Technology and Telecom have agreed to benefit from each other's experience in the field of information and communication technology for proliferation of ICT in Pakistan.

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Does this all not sound so redundant already? Yes, just about everything is for free including free tea and biscuits when you are a client who enters through the doors of an education consultancy business

However, there is a thin line between guidance and ignorance, which is why there is a catch in every "FREE" service that you avail in any business today. The truth is that business is business and a cup of tea is a cup of tea. The laid-back and spoon-fed clients are usually the ones who find themselves cheated and robbed because they put their trust and fortune in the hands of certified, but not qualified professionals. Studying overseas can be a blessing in disguise for anyone and everyone who is unaware about the challenges of living away from home. Foreign degrees, internationally acclaimed and accredited colleges and universities with work experience and exposure are some of the many reasons why students choose to go abroad. However, with the current state of our country where corruption and felony are spreading like the plague, students and parents often fall victim to the mass gimmick promoted by some educational consultancies.

Sadly, apart from a few, the wide majority operate for their own vested interest of minting money by any means necessary as they do not have any code of ethics. This gives them the opportunity to benefit from the free market and exploit gimmicks to make money off students and parents who could otherwise deal directly with the higher education institution abroad.

Consultants are self-employed professionals who provide solutions to problems in a particular area or specialised field. School counsellors, on the other hand, are employed by schools and are qualified and experienced advisors in education planning. In the case of Pakistan, educational consultants have actually redefined the role of academic counsellors and immigration consultants by performing similar job functions and more without legitimate qualification and experience. As a result, we have a growing number of educational consultancy firms with little to no quality of service and commitment to the noble field. Contrary to academic counsellors, who are practitioners bound by school policies and code of conduct, educational consultants are not bound by any particular statutory rules for practitioners or businesses because they are not directly governed by the Ministry of Education. Following are a few hard facts:

1. There are beyond 5,000 education consultancy firms currently operating in Pakistan with partner offices in UK, Australia, Canada, Malaysia and the United States that are registered under the same company banner.
2. From the large hoardings near Gulshan-i-Iqbal, Karachi alone has over 2,500 education consultants (and still growing).
3. One-fifth of the graduating students are bound to get influenced due to peer pressure or foreign benefits and test the educational consultancy option at least once.

4. Ninety per cent of the people will prepare fake bank statements to show affordability for education at foreign universities (collateral/security/sponsor).

5. Ten pc of the people will end up being cheated or lose money either because of the cheque being made out to the individual or business and not to the academic institution, or because they fail to understand the gimmick behind on-spot admissions.

6. Under the new student visa rules implemented after April 21, 2011, qualifying IELTS is compulsory for any student to apply overseas for study and work permits. Yet, students will opt for the sub-standard language teaching provided at most consultancies to achieve a lower band score instead of studying from content experts or professionals.

7. Eighty-five pc of parents and students will try and avail the "free lunch" offered by marketing schemes such as IELTS free scholarship, 50pc consultation fees discount, free IELTS, laptops and tablets and more.

It is no surprise that with so much of deception in our society, people can easily lose their hard-earned fortune instantly. Ever wondered why there is a high number of such businesses including franchises? What makes them more reliable or qualified than bona fide and non-commercial school practitioners? How is it that when a student applies directly to foreign universities, the scholarships available are limited and different than what an education consultancy offers? What is the difference between a bank statement and loan letter for student visa? What are the forms of hidden charges and how are candidates hoaxed via free IELTS training, no consultation and processing fees, and so-called non-merit-based scholarships?

In a study conducted in 2010, about 85pc were unregistered consultants, of whom the majority was found engaging in ethically-dubious practices. Just like the saying, "There are no free lunches in the world", one can be sure to pay a heavy cut. One such instance was of a lady who lost \$25,000 because she was trying to study for IELTS and apply for a business visa to the UK to launch a tourism business with her husband but the consultant ran off with her money. Here are some guidelines to play smart and avoid scams: I Always conduct a thorough background check on the educational consultant and the organisation including their affiliated institution. Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies (CAS) letters that universities issue cannot be given to students directly by any consultant unless they or their firm are authorised and declared by the university as "Regional Representative" for that university. You may call or email the academic institution abroad to find out.

I Do not be fooled by large billboards with success rates because they typically range from Rs35,000 to 500,000 per month, which may or may not be sponsored by foreign agencies, but this amount is and can be recovered from only a couple of students who spend \$500,000 or more. I Remember, education consultants cannot deal with immigration because not only is a law degree required for this but they must also be legal practitioners and work with the bar association of the country. Legal practitioners and/or their consultancy and business name can easily be found on the country's tourism website.

I No consultancy can guarantee visas and this is a common lie found in some firms. Be sure to make bank drafts/money orders in the name of the academic institution you are applying to or in the name of the consultant general who is issuing you a study or business visa.

I Large sums of money are charged in the form of offer letters alone. An "on-spot admission" only guarantees offer letters issued by agents and not the university. Some consultants may

ask you to submit the letter to the embassy so that they can disappear, which is why their address and telephone numbers keep changing.

I Just like the saying, "Too many cooks spoil the broth," involving too many agents is almost a guarantee that one would lose one's fortune and so it is advisable to avoid middlemen.

With Sharea Faisal and especially the Gulshan-i-Iqbal area being flooded with consultancies, there is no denying the fact that the field of educational consulting has grown considerably in the past decade. Perhaps, it is the second most lucrative profession after politics, which is a beast all in itself. However, one needs to understand that there are no shortcuts in life.

Education is the life blood of any country and as such, students, parents, teachers and academic institutions need to be vigilant of malpractices and follow a proper channel to apply abroad for education or business.

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From brick kilns to blackboards

"My father, Muhammad Yousuf, is 49 years old and earns Rs8,000 a month. He has to support all of us. We are a big family - there's Amma, my older sisters Sarno and Balla, me and three younger siblings, aged 4, 5 and 6," says Mirza as he sits outside their small hut, shielding his eyes from the sun. "I want to help my family out of this situation. Mirza works in the brick kilns of Darwaish Kat, in the suburbs of Lahore. In kilns such as this, entire families pitch in, simply to make ends meet. "Our house is made out of the same bricks and clay we used, to play with all day long while helping Amma and Abba as they prepared the bricks in the scorching sun. These marks are sun burns," says young Mirza while pointing to patches on his skin. "They are better now. I am seeing a doctor and I put ointment on these every day." Mirza's desire to help his family, to improve his condition, is obvious with every sentence. "I weakened my knees when I started to help at work. We would get done in the evening and, by then, it would be impossible to stand," he says quietly.

With a vision

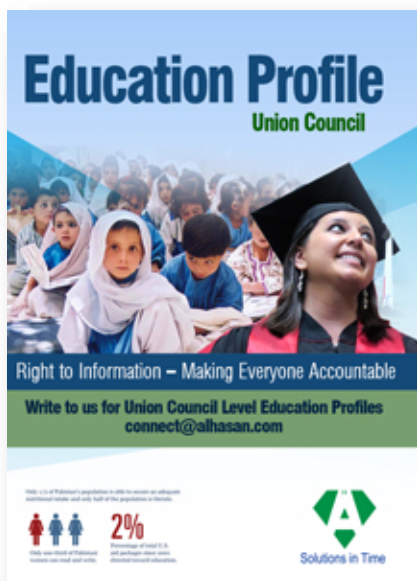
The International Labour Organization (ILO) is working towards the socio-economic uplift of the families at the Darwaish Kat brick kilns. The family empowerment package targets both generations: It provides non formal basic education to children to help them out of hazardous work activity that may affect their physical and mental well being; and it offers adult literacy services to men and women to empower them with basic functional language and accounting skills, so that they can protect themselves from exploitative work practices, such as under-payment of wages. Non Formal Basic Education centres are established on the premises of the kiln. "It is time to think out of the box. The need is to provide an alternative basic education for out-of-school children. But what is important is to make these programs adaptable, flexible and inclusive," says Dr Ayesha, Senior Research Specialist at the Education Development Centre of USAID. "An

integrative curriculum with a focus on water, sanitation and health for a country like Pakistan where polio is endemic is a dire need in the prevailing situation."

Changing mindsets

Mirza, like many other children, has joined the ILO-run education centre close by. "Amma and Abba are very happy. They say that only education can help me out of this trap, and that I am their only hope. After my father started to go to the centre for adults, he took us out of work. Now, he says we should all be healthy and work only when we are older, maybe at age 18. Look at my hands!" he says, a smile on his face, explaining how his teacher instructed the class to diligently wash up before eating. "I tell Amma everything I learn at the school." Mirza's voice is animated as excitement contagious.

"I got an opportunity to participate in the cultural mela organized by my school a few weeks ago. I drew paintings and made toys with clay," he exclaims. "The department is committed to reaching out to the poorest of areas where mainstream education is not available or accessible," says Nadeem Alam Butt, additional secretary at the Literacy and Non Formal Basic Education Department in Punjab. "Through our NFE and Adult Literacy Centres, we are ensuring quality education and life skills to children and adults in an environment that boosts their confidence and empowers them to stand on their own feet and secure a decent living." Clearly, non formal education is having an impact, as illustrated by Mirza and his family. "My class is so colourful! We have charts on the wall with alphabets and numbers," shouts Mirza, as he starts to count out loud to show off his new skills. "I love my school."

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K-P's Education Test:

Not too long ago, the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) made headlines and serious waves by becoming the first major party to come up with a detailed education policy. Like any policy, it was far from perfect, yet it was a highly commendable first on our political scene for a variety of reasons. First, it forced other parties to discuss education as part of their party manifestos. Second, the PTI education policy had highlighted a number of high priority areas that are desperately needed to take our education system out of the deep hole it currently resides in. Finally, the PTI model proposed to integrate education with social development, including schooling for girls, teacher training and introduction of schools in remote villages.

In the post-May 11 world, the PTI now finds itself in an intriguing position. It has formed government in Khyber-Pakhtunkhwa (K-P), where issues of security are more pronounced than other parts of the country. Also, in the post-Eighteenth Amendment landscape, all things to do with education are the responsibility of the provincial governments. Finally, it is also safe to say that a significant portion of the PTI vote bank, both locally and nationally, cares deeply about education. Given these complex circumstances, the PTI's education policy will be watched by many as a litmus test on both the core values of the party and the practical considerations of governing the province.

For me, personally, there are three major promises that I hope the new K-P government is able to keep. First is the promise to significantly increase spending on education. By no means is this an easy task, especially given the security and the energy crises. But for a party to make education a centrepiece of its election campaign and not even attempt to deliver would have long-term consequences. There is little doubt that the system of education is spiralling out of control. Poor governance, corruption, lack of teacher training and dilapidated infrastructure are just a few of the challenges faced by the local educational system that would require serious investment and significantly improved quality control practices.

Second is the issue of access. In the land of Malala Yousafzai, where brave female students risk their lives to attend schools, the issue of ensuring quality education for the female half of the school-going population is not going to be easy. There are real, deeply-rooted social norms that need to be challenged to ensure access for girls' education. Even during elections, there were widespread reports of "community leaders" ensuring that women did not leave their homes to vote in places such as Lower Dir. This is a formidable challenge but also, a real test of the resolve of the party leadership in creating a more equal and just society.

Finally, I am eager to find out how the landscape of higher education in the province unfolds under the PTI leadership. The PTI has made some bold promises about innovation and research in science and technology. Existing universities in the province, barring one which is highly selective and private, have not had any substantial impact on innovation even at the national level. Research is expensive and in a country where electricity is more often unavailable than available, the price to keep a provincial innovation engine running is beyond astronomical. But as is the case with other challenges, inaction is no longer an option.

There is no doubt that there are many other high-profile challenges for the incoming K-P government, but I hope that this time, education will not be an afterthought ministry. Just as during the campaign, the PTI set the precedence in discussing education, I hope that they will also set the precedence of making education a priority during governance.

There are some reports in the media that the Jamaat-e-Islami might get the education portfolio. While that may be the case, the buck eventually stops with the chief minister. For a lot of observers, including myself, he will not only play a role in the future of K-P, he, more than anyone else, will also shape the future national prospects of the party.

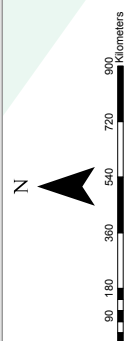
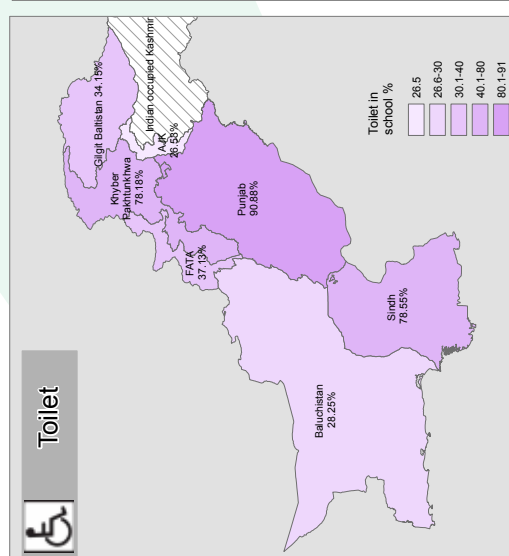
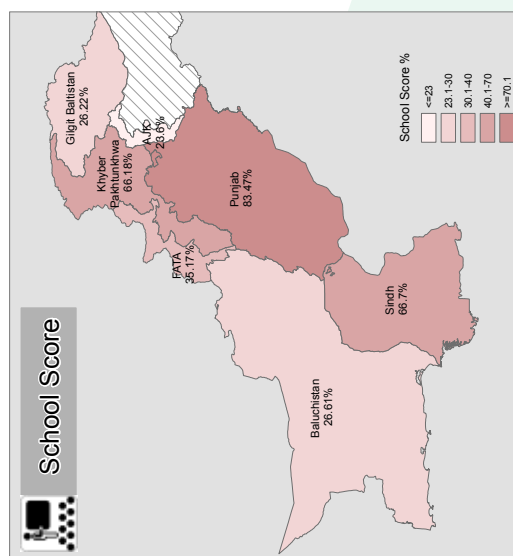
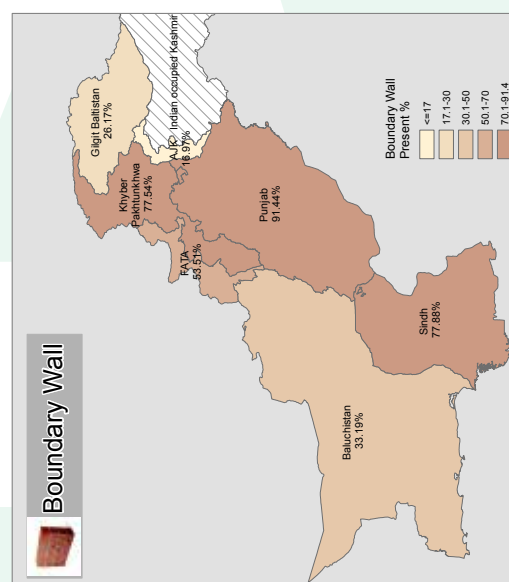
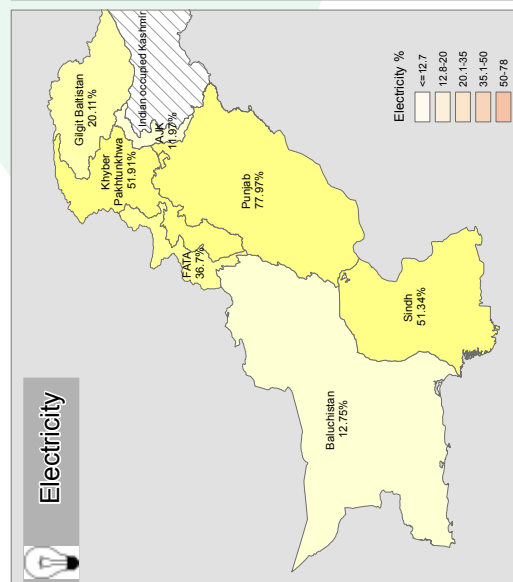
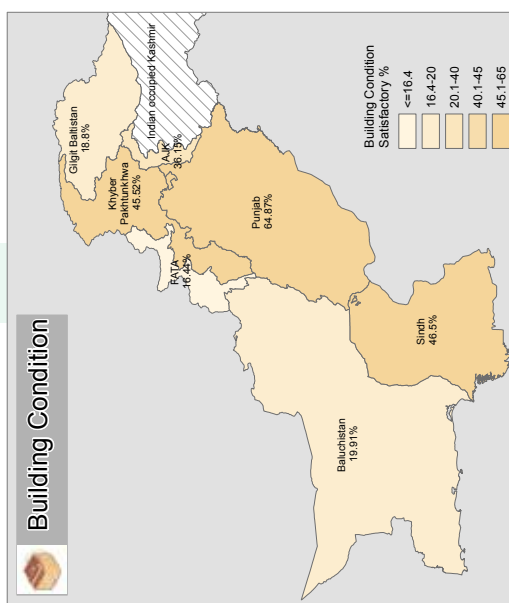
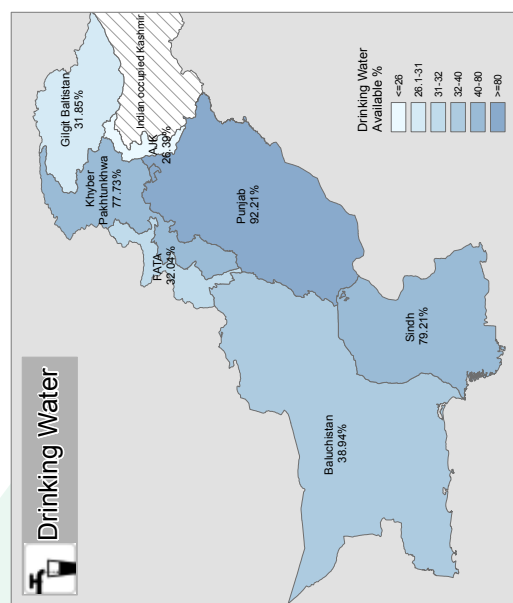


Province wise status of MDG-2 (Achieving Universal Primary Education)-Pakistan



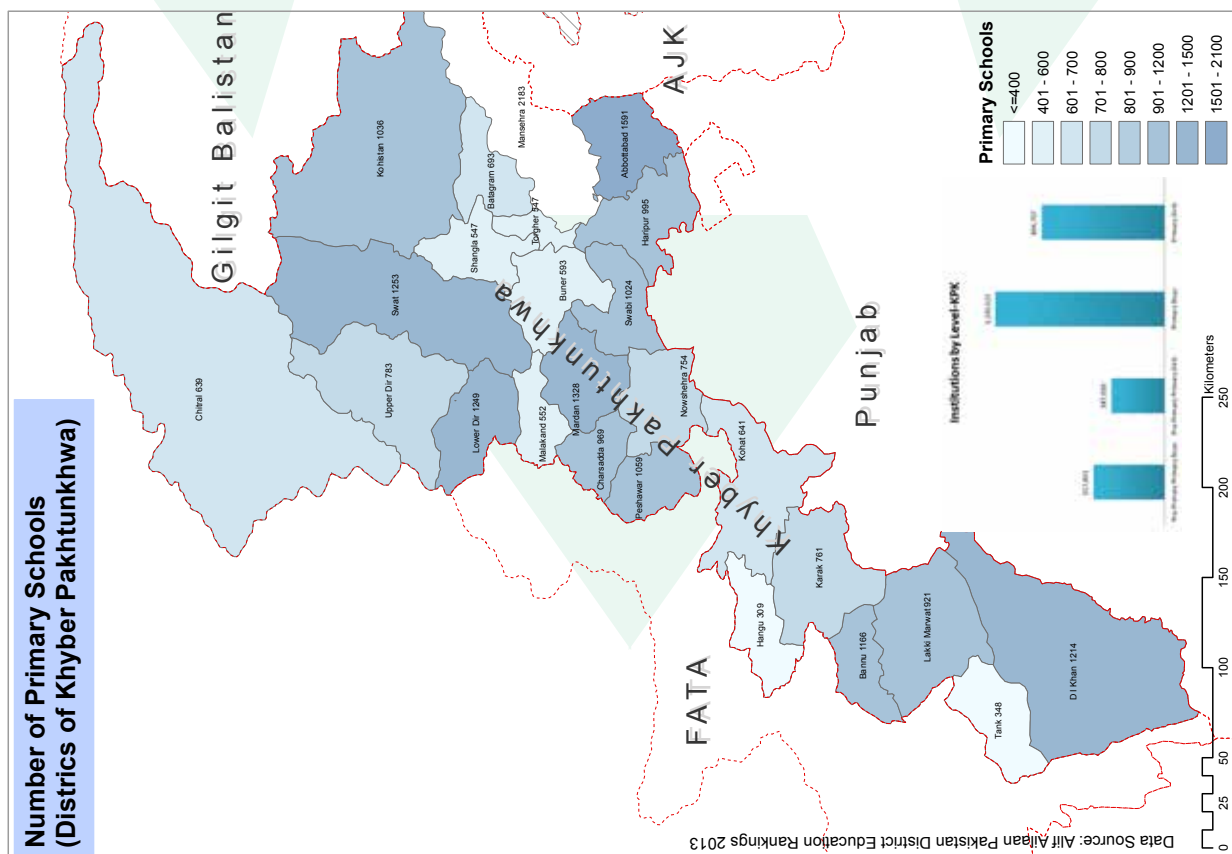
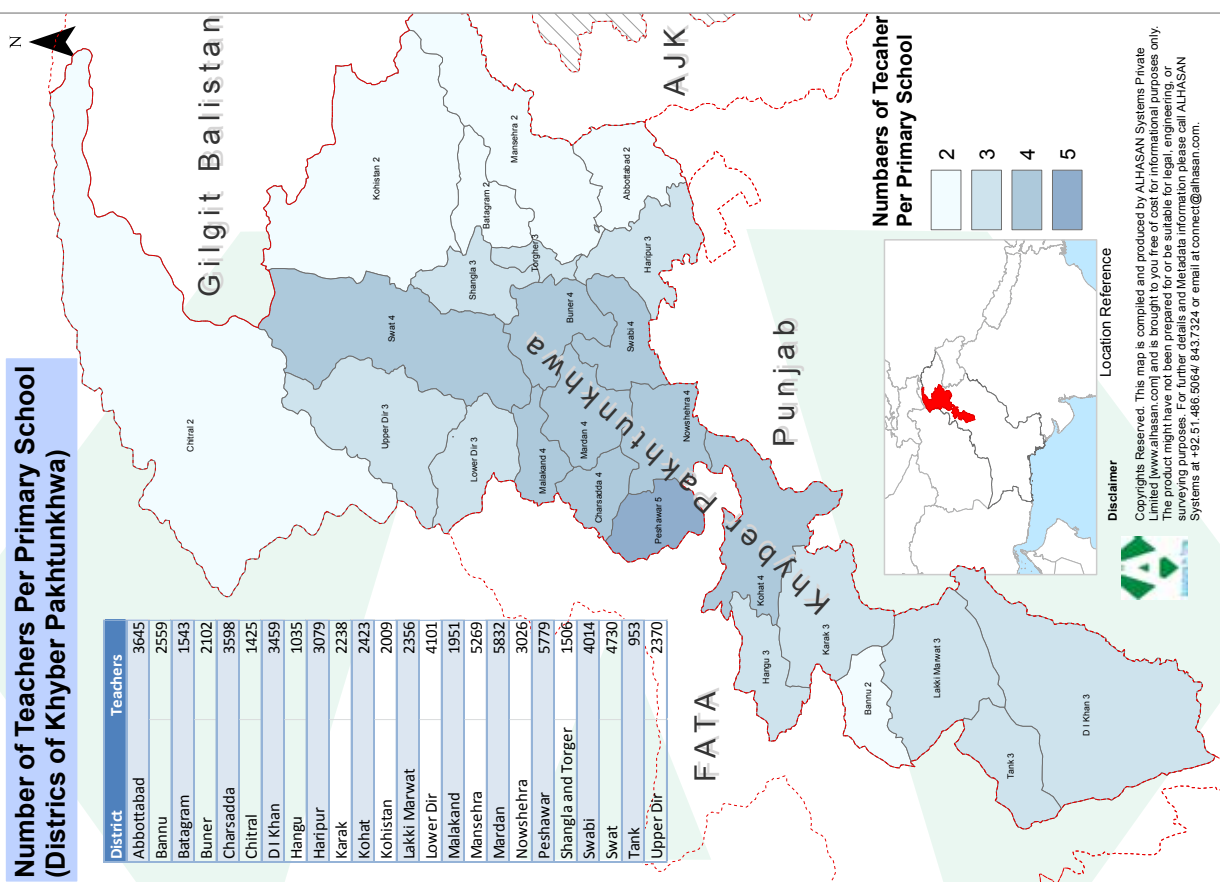

کو در گزر بھی کر دیا جائے تو اساتذہ کو کون سمجھائے جن کو ہمارے مذہب میں روحانی والدین کا درجہ دیا گیا ہے۔ کئی سال پہلے اساتذہ گاؤں میں درختوں کے نیچے کھلے میدانوں میں بھی بچوں کو پوری دل جمعی سے پڑھاتے تھے لیکن اب تو حالات ہی کچھ اور ہیں خواتین اساتذہ سکولوں میں طلباء سے سبزی بنوار ہی ہوتی ہیں پاؤں دبواتی ہیں۔ کیا والدین اپنے بچوں کو اس لئے سکول بھیجتے ہیں تاکہ وہ یہ فرائض سرانجام دیں اور پڑھائی میں بالکل دل نہ لگائیں۔ ایک سے دوسری مرتبہ سوال پوچھنے پر یا کوئی غلطی کرنے پر خوب مار پیٹا جاتا ہے گالیاں دی جاتی ہیں۔ ان سب اعمال سے بچے ڈر کر پڑھائی سے بھاگنا شروع ہو جاتے ہیں سکول جانے سے کتراتے ہیں اور یہاں سے بنیاد بنتی ہے چور اور ڈاکوؤں کی، ایک کرپٹ معاشرے کی، استاد تو قوم کے معمار ہوتے ہیں خدا را آنے والے کل سے ڈر کر ہی اس نظام کو بہتر بنائیں جب ہم سب بارگاہ خداوندی میں جواب دہ ہوں گے۔ یہ اسباب میرٹ پر ملازمتیں نہ دینے کے سبب ہیں۔ چھاپہ مارٹیوں کو چاہئے کہ غیر اعلانیہ طور پر سکولوں میں کم از کم ہفتے میں دو مرتبہ وزٹ کریں اور اساتذہ کے ساتھ ساتھ طلباء سے بھی تمام مشکلات اور حالات کے بارے میں پوچھیں تاکہ سکول سسٹم بہتر ہو سکے۔ مانا کہ پاکستان میں بھی اچھے اور قابل انگلش میڈیم سکول موجود ہیں لیکن وہ پرائیویٹ سکولز ہیں اور ان کی فیسیں آسمانوں سے باتیں کرتی ہیں جو ہمارا غریب اور متوسط طبقہ برداشت نہیں کر سکتا۔ اس کے علاوہ ہمارے تعلیمی بورڈز کا حال احوال بھی سب لوگوں نے پیچھے دنوں دیکھ لیا ہوگا۔ کیا یہ ہے ہمارا نظام تعلیم کیا ان سب کا کوئی حل نہیں۔ گورنمنٹ کالجز اور یونیورسٹیوں کا حال کچھ بہتر ہے لیکن جو مراعات گورنمنٹ کالجز اور یونیورسٹیوں کے طلباء کو دی جاتی ہیں وہ پرائیویٹ تعلیم حاصل کرنے والے طلباء کو نہیں دی جاتیں جس کی ایک مثال لیپ ٹاپس کی تقسیم ہے جو صرف میرٹ کی بنیاد پر گورنمنٹ یونیورسٹیوں کے طلباء کو دیئے جا رہے ہیں، پرائیویٹ کو نہیں۔ گورنمنٹ سے پوچھا جائے کہ پرائیویٹ سٹوڈنٹس کہاں جائیں؟ حکومت کو چاہئے کہ سکولز، کالجز اور یونیورسٹیوں میں ہونے والے مسائل اور کرپشن کی روک تھام کے لئے جلد سے جلد کوئی موثر قدم اٹھائے۔

تعلیم انفرادی و اجتماعی طور پر سب کے لئے نہایت اہم ہے۔ تعلیم معاشرے کو بہتر شہری، ذہین بچے اور باشعور ووٹرز دیتی ہے۔ تعلیم ہر قوم کی بنیاد ہوتی ہے، جو قوم کو معاشی دولت، معاشرتی استحکام اور سیاسی قابلیت دیتی ہے۔ تعلیم ایک بہترین سرمایہ کاری ہے جو لوگوں کو ملازمت کے مواقع مہیا کرتی ہے اور ایک اچھا انسان بننے میں مدد دیتی ہے۔ انفرادی طور پر تعلیم یافتہ ہونا کسی بھی ملک کی ترقی و استحکام کے لئے ضروری ہے۔ تعلیم میں سرمایہ کاری بہتر اور پڑھی لکھی لیبر فورس، پیداواری صلاحیتوں اور ہنر مند ورکرز میں اضافہ کرتی ہے۔ تعلیم میں سرمایہ کاری اور تجارت ترقی یافتہ ممالک میں معاشی و معاشرتی ترقی کی بنیاد ہے۔ تعلیم حکومت اور عوام دونوں کو برابر نفع دیتی ہے۔ تحریک پاکستان سے قبل برصغیر پاک و ہند میں مسلمانوں کی شرح خواندگی نہایت کم تھی۔ سرسید احمد خان نے نہایت کم وسائل اور دو مختلف قوموں کے باوجود جو اقدام اٹھائے ایسی اعلیٰ مثالیں بہت کم دیکھنے میں آتی ہیں۔ ایک سکول کو کالج اور یونیورسٹی تک لے گئے جب مسلمان اس وقت ایسی اعلیٰ کاوشیں کر سکتے ہیں تو آج اس آزاد ملک میں کیوں نہیں کر سکتے۔ ہمارے مذہب میں بھی تعلیم پر بہت زور دیا گیا ہے آنحضرتؐ نے تعلیم کو بہت اہمیت دی اسی لئے جنگی قیدیوں کی رہائی مسلمان بچوں کو پڑھانے کے عوض رکھی گئی تھی، لیکن اس کے باوجود پاکستان میں شرح خواندگی بہت کم ہے اور قدرتی وسائل سے مالا مال ہونے کے باوجود ہم ان سے مستفید نہیں ہو پا رہے۔ ابتدائی تعلیم بچوں کو ٹھوس بنیاد مہیا کرتی ہے جو سب بچوں کو سکول سے ملتی ہے۔ اگر سکول کا ماحول اور اساتذہ کی حکمت عملی اچھی ہو تو یہ دونوں عوامل بڑھتے بچوں کو ترقی کی جانب راغب کرتے ہیں۔ لیکن پاکستان میں تو سکولوں کا کوئی حال نہیں ہے نہ صرف پسماندہ علاقوں میں بلکہ شہروں میں بھی۔ گورنمنٹ سکولز کھنڈرات کا منظر پیش کرتے ہیں چند ماہ قبل ایک انجی چینل نے سکولوں کا جو حال دکھایا ہے اس کو بھلایا نہیں جاسکتا ہے۔ گریڈ پرائمری سکول میں پانی کھڑا ہے اور وہاں بھینسیں نہا رہی ہیں۔ شمالی علاقہ جات میں ایک سکول کو بطور گودام استعمال کیا جا رہا ہے کہیں طلباء انتظار میں بیٹھے ہیں اساتذہ چھٹی پر ہیں۔ اگر سکول کی عمارتوں

فیصل آباد (جہا نگرا شرف) سوشل ویلفیئر ڈیپارٹمنٹ پنجاب نے فیصل آباد سمیت صوبہ بھر کے سرکاری و نجی کالجز میں زیر تعلیم نابینا، سماعت اور گویائی سے محروم طالبات کا سروے کرنے کا فیصلہ کیا ہے۔ اس حوالے سے فیصل آباد سمیت صوبہ بھر کے ڈسٹرکٹ آفیسرز کو پر فارمے ارسال کر دیئے گئے ہیں جبکہ پر فارمے پر کروانے کا ٹاسک ڈپٹی ڈسٹرکٹ آفیسران کو سونپ دیا گیا ہے۔ پر فارمے کے مطابق فیصل آباد کے سرکاری و نجی کالجز میں گیارہویں سے سولہویں تک زیر تعلیم ایسی تمام طالبات کا ڈیٹا اکٹھا کیا جائے گا جو بینائی، سماعت اور گویائی سے محروم ہوں۔ سروے میں صرف طالبات کا ریکارڈ طلب کیا گیا ہے جو کسی بھی ادارے سے ایف اے، ایف ایس سی، بی اے، بی ایس سی، ایم اے یا ایم ایس سی کر رہی ہوں۔ واضح رہے کہ سوشل ویلفیئر ڈیپارٹمنٹ کی طرف سے تاحال سروے کے مقاصد بیان نہیں کئے گئے لیکن ماتحت افسران کو جلد از جلد سروے رپورٹ مکمل کر کے ڈائریکٹر جنرل سوشل ویلفیئر ڈیپارٹمنٹ پنجاب کو بھجوانے کی ہدایت کی گئی ہے۔

ہر باشعور قوم حالات زمانہ کے ساتھ ملک کے تعلیمی نظام میں تبدیلیاں ضرور کرتی رہتی ہے، لیکن یہ ہماری بد قسمتی رہی کہ ہمارے حکمران تعلیمی میدان میں بہتری لانے کے لئے اعلیٰ سطح پر سنجیدہ اقدامات کرنے سے گریز کرتے ہیں۔ اکیسویں صدی میں ترقی کی راہوں پر گامزن اقوام سے قدم ملا کر چلنے کے لئے یکساں تعلیم کی راہ میں حائل رکاوٹیں دور کرنا شد ضروری ہے۔ کسی بھی ملک کی ترقی کا دار و مدار اس ملک کے اعلیٰ تعلیمی اداروں پر ہوتا ہے جو ملک کے معماروں کی مخفی صلاحیتوں کو اجاگر کرتے ہیں۔ درحقیقت ذہنی اور فکری صلاحیتوں کی آبیاری کے لئے ایسا تعلیمی ماحول بدلتے وقت کی ضرورت ہے جو انسانی سوچ کے ارتقاء آزادی اور جداگانہ اقدار کی ترویج میں معاونت کرے۔ ہمارے تعلیمی اداروں کا اولین مقصد یہی ہونا چاہئے کہ وہ طلبہ کو ایسی علمی فضا مہیا کرے جس میں تضادات پر مشتمل خیالات منظر عام پر آئیں۔ انسانی تخیل کو عمل سے ہم کنار ہونے کے لئے آزاد تعلیمی ماحول کی ضرورت ہوتی ہے۔ اسی سے انسان کی سوچ میں تنوع کارنگ نمایاں ہوتا ہے اور سماج کو درپیش مسائل کے حل سامنے آتے ہیں۔

دنیا کے جن ممالک میں تعلیم کو اہمیت حاصل ہے، اعلیٰ تعلیمی ماحول مہیا ہے اور جہاں تعلیم جدید تحقیق اور بحث و مباحثہ جیسے عوامل پر مشتمل ہے، وہیں ہمیں ترقی بھی عروج پر دکھائی دیتی ہے۔ ایسی اقوام کے مستقبل کو کوئی خطرہ لاحق نہیں اور تعلیم یافتہ اقوام کے تعلیمی ادارے ان ہی بنیادوں پر قائم ہیں۔ پاکستانی حکومتوں نے ہر دور میں مختلف تعلیمی اصلاحات متعارف کروائیں، لیکن جب تک یکساں نظام تعلیم کے لئے دیانتداری کے ساتھ کوشش نہیں کی جائے گی کسی بھی نوعیت کی تعلیمی اصلاحات کامیابی سے ہمکنار نہیں ہو سکتیں۔

تعلیم نہ صرف قوم کو جدید علوم و فنون سے روشناس کراتی ہے بلکہ ایک مہذب معاشرے میں انسان کو انسانیت کی معراج تک پہنچانے میں بھی اہم کردار ادا کرتی ہے۔ جب علم کی روشنی یکساں بنیادوں پر فراہم کی جائے گی تو غربت بھی کسی طالب علم کی راہ میں حائل نہیں ہوگی۔ ذہین طلبہ کے لئے وظائف کا فعال نظام ہو، نیز تعلیمی اصلاحات کے لئے ملک کے پس ماندہ ترین قصبوں اور دیہات کو نظر انداز نہ کیا جائے تو ہمارے غریب لیکن ہونہار طالب علم بحیثیت زندہ قوم، دنیا بھر میں اپنی صلاحیتیں منوا سکتے ہیں۔

روپے اخراجات کی مد میں مختص کیے گئے ہیں۔ بجٹ کے مطابق ایلیمینٹری تعلیم کے لئے 1336 ملین، ٹیچرز ایجوکیشن کے لئے 187 ملین، سینڈری ایجوکیشن کے لئے 4785.519 ملین، کالج ایجوکیشن کے لئے 3181.377 ملین، اعلیٰ تعلیم کے لئے 1897.117 ملین روپے مختص کیے گئے ہیں۔

نئے بجٹ میں سندھ کی بڑی جامعات کو نظر انداز کر دیا گیا

اعلیٰ تعلیم کی مد میں مجموعی طور پر ایک ارب 89 کروڑ مختص کئے گئے ہیں کراچی (اسٹاف رپورٹر) نئی حکومت جس نے اپنے سابقہ دور میں سندھ میں صرف ایک نئی یونیورسٹی قائم کی جبکہ 9 مختلف کالجوں کو جامعات کا درجہ دینے اس بار اعلیٰ تعلیم کی مد میں مجموعی طور پر 1 ارب 89 کروڑ 71 لاکھ 17 ہزار روپے مختص کیے ہیں۔ نئے بجٹ میں سندھ کی بڑی جامعات کو نظر انداز کر دیا اور ان کے لیے کوئی گرانٹ مختص نہیں کی حتیٰ کہ اپنے سابقہ دور میں قائم کی جانے والی جامعات صوفی یونیورسٹی ہالا، ٹیاری، بیگم نصرت بھٹو خواجہ تین یونیورسٹی سکھر، لائیو اسٹاک یونیورسٹی سکرنڈ، داؤد انجینئرنگ یونیورسٹی سمیت دیگر جامعات جنہیں اعلیٰ تعلیمی کمیشن کی جانب سے بھی کوئی گرانٹ نہیں مل رہی انہیں بھی کسی قسم کی گرانٹ نہیں دی

لگا ہے۔ اس صورت حال سے کاروباری ذہن رکھنے والے افراد میدان میں آئے اور انہوں نے معمولی سرمایہ لگا کر ”انگلش میڈیم“ کے لیبل سے اپنے کاروبار کا آغاز کیا اور اب ہر گلی محلے میں نجی سکول خود روپوں کی طرح وجود میں آگئے ہیں۔ یوں یہ کاروبار اب خوب چمک رہا ہے۔ انہیں سکولوں سے میٹرک کرنے والے طالب علم کو چند سو روپے کے عوض ”استاد“ رکھ لیا جاتا ہے۔ گوذریعہ تعلیم انگریزی ہے مگر ناتجربہ کار اساتذہ کے باعث حوصلہ افزا نتائج سامنے نہیں آئے۔ ایک ناخواندہ فرد بھی معمولی سرمائے سے کسی گلی میں سکول قائم کر لیتا ہے۔ ان سکولوں میں تعلیم کی کیا صورت حال ہے؟ یہ جاننے کے لئے کسی فعال نظام کا وجود نہیں۔

اب ان سکولوں کی کارکردگی پر نظر ڈالتے ہیں جہاں قوم کی کل آبادی کے ایک فیصد سے بھی کم بچے تعلیم حاصل کر پاتے ہیں۔ ان سکولوں میں انتظامیہ، اعلیٰ تعلیم اور وسیع تجربے کی حامل ہوتی ہے۔ جدید سہولتوں سے مزین ان سکولوں میں بچوں کی ذہنی، جسمانی اور نفسیاتی تقاضوں کے پیش نظر ایک صحت مند تعلیمی ماحول تشکیل دیا جاتا ہے۔ ان تعلیمی اداروں سے فارغ التحصیل بچے اعلیٰ ملازمتوں کے اہل قرار پاتے ہیں۔ ملک کے یہ منگے سکول خاص طبقے تک محدود ہیں۔ ماضی میں یکساں نظام تعلیم رائج کرنے کے لئے تجاویز پیش کی جاتی رہیں۔ تاہم، ان پر عملدرآمد کی سعی قصداً نہیں کی گئی، کیونکہ حکمران طبقہ یہ ہر گز نہیں چاہتا کہ ملک کی کثیر آبادی، اعلیٰ تعلیم، شعور اور آگاہی سے بہرہ ور ہو کر اس قابل ہو جائے کہ مٹھی بھر بااثر طبقات نے عوام کو کھوکھلے نعرے بن جائے۔ یہی وجہ ہے کہ سرمایہ دار، وڈیرہ شاہی اور زمیندار طبقات نے عوام کو کھوکھلے نعرے ضرور دیئے لیکن عملی اقدامات سے ہمیشہ گریز ہی کیا۔ اتنا ہی نہیں بلکہ ایسے وزیر تعلیم بھی تعینات کئے گئے جو خود تقریباً ناخواندہ تھے۔

آج بھی پاکستان کے پس ماندہ دیہات میں ایسے سکولوں کی کمی نہیں جو علاقے کے بااثر افراد کے ”اوطاق“ میں تبدیل ہو چکے ہیں۔ یہ ہمارے ملک کی تعلیم کا حال ہے۔ جبکہ بھارت، سری لنکا اور مالدیپ وہ ممالک ہیں جنہوں نے تعلیم کی مد میں انقلابی تبدیلیاں کیں۔ ان ممالک میں ہر سطح پر غریب، امیر اور متوسط طبقات کے لئے یکساں تعلیم کے مواقع فراہم کئے گئے اور اب صورت حال یہ ہے کہ ان ممالک کے ہنرمند تعلیم یافتہ نوجوان دنیا بھر کے نامور اداروں میں فرائض انجام دے رہے ہیں۔ چونکہ پاکستان کے حکمرانوں نے تعلیمی مسائل سے ہمیشہ چشم پوشی اختیار کئے رکھی لہذا، آج یہ حال ہے کہ پاکستان دیگر ممالک کا ساتھ دینے کے قابل نہیں۔ حالانکہ یہ تو

بائیں سبجکشن کمیشن اسلام آباد کی اسٹوڈنٹس مینجمنٹ کمیٹی کے فیصلے کی روشنی میں طلبہ کو دی جاتی ہے۔

سابقہ دور میں تعلیم نظر انداز، نئے بجٹ میں 132 ارب مختص

کراچی (اسٹاف رپورٹر) سابقہ دور میں تعلیم کو نظر انداز کرنے والی حکومت نے بجٹ 2013-14 میں تعلیم کی مد میں 132 ارب 20 کروڑ روپے کی رقم مختص کی ہے۔ گزشتہ حکومت میں کوئی نیا سکول قائم نہ کرنے والی حکومت نے اس بار بجٹ 2013-14 میں 106 نئے اسکول قائم کرنے کیلئے 2 ارب 5 کروڑ کی خطیر رقم مختص کی ہے۔ 2008 تا 2012 تک سندھ بھر میں صرف 3 کالج قائم کرنے والی حکومت نے اس بار 56 نئے کالج قائم کرنے کی جاری اسکیم کے لیے 56 کروڑ 34 لاکھ جبکہ انجینئرنگ، قانون، کمپیوٹر سائنس و دیگر کے لیے 53 کروڑ 9 لاکھ روپے مختص کیے ہیں۔ بجٹ میں سندھ میں 7 نئے کیڈٹ کالجز قائم کرنے کے لیے بھی 63 کروڑ 51 لاکھ روپے مختص کیے ہیں۔ سندھ اسبجکشن فاؤنڈیشن کو 2 ارب 20 کروڑ روپے کی رقم دینے کی تجویز دی گئی ہے۔ بجٹ تجاویز کے مطابق 13 ارب 48 کروڑ روپے ترقیاتی کاموں جبکہ 118 ارب 74 کروڑ

اور اب صورت حال یہ ہے کہ ایک ہی ملک میں تین اقسام کے طریق ہائے تعلیم رائج ہیں۔ ہر سکول اپنی پسند سے نصاب منتخب کرتا ہے۔ سرکاری سکولوں کے نصاب کا اصول تو یہ ہے کہ نسل در نسل ایک ہی سبق کا باقاعدہ رٹا لگایا جاتا ہے۔ یہ سرکاری سکول غریب طبقے کے لئے مخصوص ہیں جہاں تعلیمی ماحول صحت مند تفریح اور صلاحیتوں کے اظہار کے مواقع مفقود ہیں۔ یہ امر بھی قابل افسوس ہے کہ حکومت کے زیر اثر سرکاری سکولوں کی حالت قابل رحم ہے۔ بے شمار سکول ایسے ہیں جن کا اندراج سرکاری کاغذات میں تو موجود ہے مگر زمین پر ان کا سرے سے کہیں وجود نہیں۔ اسی طرح ہزاروں سکولوں میں بچوں کے لئے پینے کا پانی میسر نہیں ہے۔ عمارت، فرنیچر اور بیت الخلا وغیرہ جیسی بنیادی ضروریات سے محروم سکولوں کو تو سکول کہنا ہی عجیب لگتا ہے۔ یہ قانوناً جرم قرار دیا جانا چاہئے پھر سرکاری سکولوں میں ذریعہ تعلیم اردو ہے۔ ان سکولوں سے فارغ التحصیل طالب علم معلومات عامہ، تہذیب و اقدار اور اعلیٰ شخصی خوبیوں سے قطعاً عاری ہوتے ہیں۔ سرکاری سکولوں کے گھٹن زدہ ماحول سے بچے فرار حاصل کرنے کے لئے گھروں ہی سے بھاگ کھڑے ہوتے ہیں۔

غربت کی چکی میں پسے والے ناخواندہ والدین اپنے بچوں کو پڑھانے کی خواہش ضرور دل میں رکھتے ہیں لیکن مجبور ہو کر یہ بچے مختلف ورکشاپس میں کام سیکھنے کے لئے لگا دیئے جاتے ہیں۔ سرکاری سکولوں کی مجموعی کارکردگی پر طائرانہ نگاہ ڈالنے سے ہی معلوم ہو جاتا ہے کہ گزشتہ کئی دہائیوں سے ان سکولوں کے طالب علم اوسط نمبر پر بھی پاس نہیں ہو پاتے۔ انہیں رعایتی نمبروں سے ہی پاس کیا جاتا ہے۔ علاوہ ازیں سرکاری سکولوں کے طالب علم وہ قابلیت حاصل نہیں کر پاتے جو تعلیمی سفر میں آگے بڑھنے کے لئے درکار ہوتی ہیں۔ غور کا مقام ہے کہ محرومی کے شکار یہ بچے مستقبل میں معاشرے کے سدھار میں کیا کردار ادا کر سکتے ہیں؟ اس تناظر میں یہی کہا جا سکتا ہے کہ ہمارے معاشرے میں بڑھتی لا قانونیت کے محرکات میں ایک اہم محرک یکساں مواقع کی عدم دستیابی بھی ہے، جس سے محرومی کی فضا پیدا ہو رہی ہے۔ یہی محرومی معاشرتی جرائم کو جنم دیتی ہے۔

پاکستان کی کل آبادی کا 80 فیصد سے زائد حصہ غریب طبقے پر مشتمل ہے جس کے لئے سنہری مستقبل کا خواب کبھی حقیقت کا روپ نہیں دھار سکتا۔ سرکاری تعلیمی اداروں کی گرتی ہوئی ساکھ اب اس نہج پر پہنچ چکی ہے کہ متوسط تعلیم یافتہ طبقہ اپنے بچوں کو ان سکولوں میں بھیجنے سے کترانے

کتابیں بچ گئیں اور بورڈ کے گودام میں پڑی ہوئی ہیں

وطن عزیز پاکستان کی یہ بد قسمتی رہی ہے کہ ہمارے ملک کے بیشتر شعبے قیام پاکستان کے وقت سے اب تک مختلف نوعیت اور ادھورے تجربات کا شکار ہیں۔ ان میں سرفہرست شعبہ تعلیم ہے۔ اس حساس شعبے میں ایسی ایسی بے ضابطگیاں بروئے کار لائی گئیں جن کے باعث ایک منظم نظام کی تشکیل میں رکاوٹیں حاصل ہو گئیں اور یہ شعبہ تاحال ابہام، شبہات اور ناقص حکمت عملی کا شکار ہے۔

تریسٹھ برس کا طویل عرصہ گزر جانے کے باوجود ہم یہ فیصلہ نہیں کر پائے کہ ذریعہ تعلیم کیا ہونا چاہئے؟ ہمارا نصاب تعلیم کن تبدیلیوں کا متقاضی ہے؟ تعلیمی نظام کی یہ شکستگی ہمارے تاریک مستقبل

کا پتہ دیتی ہے۔

دنیا بھر کے معاشروں میں طبقاتی فرق کسی نہ کسی درجے تک ضرور موجود ہے لیکن ہر جگہ طبقاتی فرق کی یہ خلیج بند رجحاننگ ہوتی جا رہی ہے۔ اس کے برعکس پاکستان کا المیہ یہ ہے کہ یہاں تعلیمی شعبے کو طبقاتی چھاپ کی بدترین شکل کہا جاتا ہے۔ ایک ہی ملک میں مختلف نظام تعلیم اور طریقہ تعلیم رائج ہیں۔ تعلیم کے نام پر کی جانے والی اصلاحات محض سیاسی نعروں کی حیثیت رکھتی ہیں جو صاحب اقتدار طبقہ اپنی نام نہاد شہرت میں اضافے کے لئے بلند کرتا رہتا ہے۔ کتابیں مفت تقسیم کرنے کا ڈھونگ رچانے سے غریب بچے اعلیٰ تعلیم، معیاری نصاب اور باسہولت درس گاہوں تک رسائی حاصل نہیں کر سکتے۔ یہی حقیقت ہے جسے کھلے دل سے تسلیم کر لینا چاہئے۔ تعلیم ہمارے ہاں ”برائے فروخت چیز“ بن کر رہ گئی ہے۔

یہ درست ہے کہ تعلیمی شعبہ کسی بھی ملک کا ایک شعبہ قرار دیا جاتا ہے جو دفاع اور معیشت سے بڑھ کر اہمیت کا حامل تصور کیا جاتا ہے، لیکن ہمارے ملک میں یہ شعبہ بھی قیام پاکستان سے سیاسی ریشہ دوانیوں کا شکار ہی رہا۔ کبھی کسی حکومت نے تعلیمی شعبے میں دور رس نتائج کے حامل اقدامات کئے بھی تو دوسری آنے والی حکومت نے اسے پہلی فرصت میں ہی کا عدم قرار دے دیا
