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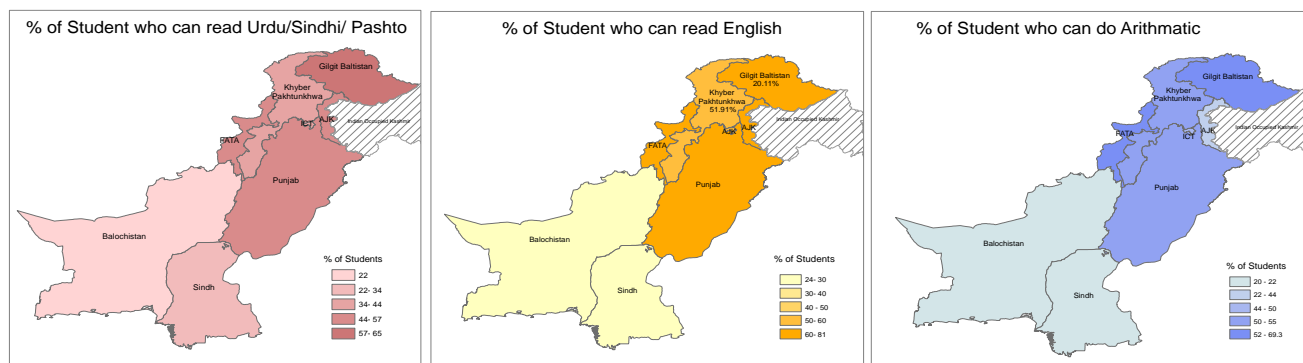
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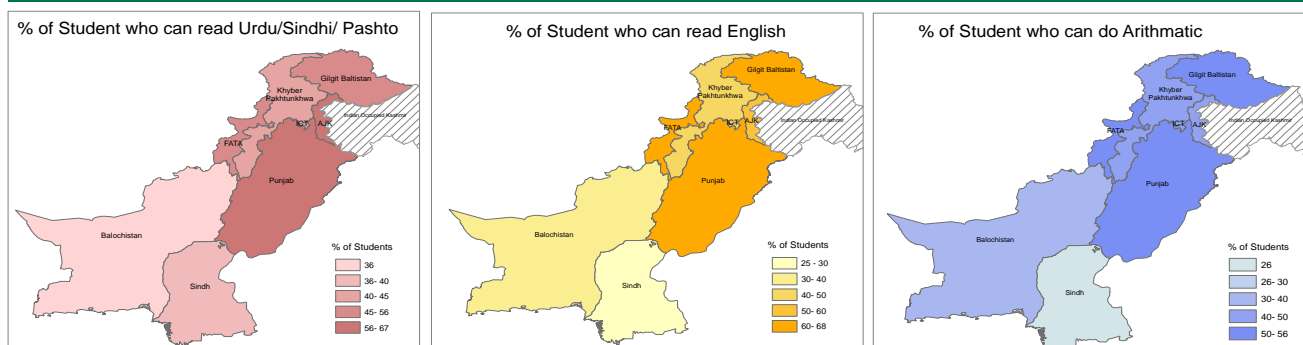

### CM Punjab takes notice: Homeless Atiya to continue education

KARACHI: Children are awarded by their parents for performing well during examinations, but this was not the case for Multan resident Atiya Laraib.

After Atiya secured 90% in her matric examinations she informed her father of the good news. However, the reaction of her father was unexpected. To Atiya's astonishment, she along with her siblings and mother were thrown out of their home by the father. The father also refused to bear any future expenses of Atiya's education.

Atiya appeared on Geo News Tuesday morning and spoke of her ordeal and the desire to continue with her education. Atiya said that when her parents found out about the result, her mother was happy but she was not even congratulated by her father.

"Instead of offering any blessings for my success, my father said this was not any big achievement."

Her prayers were answered after her story was broadcast on Geo News coming to the attention of Punjab Chief Minister Shahbaz Sharif. Mr Shairf took notice of Atiya's ordeal and ordered for her to be admitted to the Government Postgraduate College for Women. The chief minister also announced that Atiya would not have to bear the cost of tuition.

### Pakistan industries require education and training pathways

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan may not be able to achieve the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) of education by 2015 even though the government plans to increase education spending from two per cent to four of the gross domestic product.

This was stated by Minister of State for Education, Trainings and Standards in Higher Education Muhammad Baleeghur Rehman at the inaugural ceremony of a three-day conference on the Applications of Molecular Biology in Medicine and Agriculture at Quaid-e-Azam University (QAU) on Tuesday.

"To expedite the process of achieving the MDGs and Education for All targets, the government will announce a comprehensive strategy in the first week of September," Rehman said.

The minister said for the 50,000 university students in Pakistan, a programme involving a monthly stipend of Rs10,000 will be launched to support their entry into the job market. The Pakistan Manpower Institute has been taken on board to facilitate the programme as well as the Higher Education Commission which has been asked to provide interest-free loans for deserving university students, he added.

Sources privy to the development told The Express Tribune that selection committees will be constituted in universities to select recipients.

The minister said there was a proposal for fee waivers for students vying for doctoral studies from remote areas like Balochistan, rural Sindh and Federally Administered Tribal Areas. "We're looking forward to the establishment of a national curriculum commission, to be formed with the collaboration of education secretaries of all four provinces, to provide a uniform system of education," he said.

Referring to the conference, he said the mix of scientists, researchers and scholars made it the perfect platform to share experience, foster collaborations and evaluate emerging technologies in molecular biology around the globe.

QAU Vice Chancellor Prof Dr Masoom Yasin said recent advances in the field of molecular biology have resulted in the transformation of new products or processes which have flooded world markets, showering vast economic rewards on nations which have had the courage and vision to make science and technology the cornerstone of their development programmes.

**New perspective: K-P  
finalises uniform  
education system**

PESHAWAR: The Khyber-Pakhtunkhwa government has finalised its plan on introducing a uniform education system in the province.

The education department has further decided to initiate an enrolment drive to increase the number of children admitted to schools.

Minister for Education Muhammad Atif said a committee for this purpose had already been formed, adding they are currently working on formulating a short-term policy. "We will also devise a long-term policy in this respect."

Atif said the policy envisaged reforms in the education sector, which were to be implemented on an immediate basis. "We will work in accordance with the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf manifesto, and intend to overcome the gap between the elite and poor in the education sector," the minister said, adding the difference between English and Urdu mediums will also cease to exist.

"In the first phase, examinations for certain classes will be conducted through boards," he said. "We are also planning to provide free books to students."

The minister said two to three million children under the age of 10 are out of school according to a report. He added a monitoring unit would be set up to circumvent this issue. "Teams provided with mobile phones and laptops will register any complaint against schools or teachers as well," said

## Education solution to militancy and poverty: Shahbaz

Atif, adding teachers training programmes are also on the cards.

LAHORE: Punjab Chief Minister (CM) Shahbaz Sharif has said that illiteracy, poverty and extremism could be eradicated with the help of education.

"A culture of research and development, intelligence and honesty could enable us to face all challenges", he said while addressing a prize distribution ceremony to honour position holders of this years' matriculation examination at the Chief Minister's Secretariat on Saturday.

About 123 position holders from nine education boards of Punjab and 14 overall position holders from other provinces were awarded merit certificates and cash prizes.

Cash prizes of Rs 400,000, Rs 300,000 and Rs 200,000 were awarded to students who secured first, second and third positions respectively. The head of the institutions were also rewarded with Rs 200,000, Rs 150,000, and Rs 100,000 each for first, second and third positions respectively. Lauding the position holders on their commendable feat, the CM said that the dream of making Pakistan a developed country could be materialised with achievements in the field of education.

He said that students should be equipped with modern education to put the country on the path to progress. Referring to the detractors of Daanish schools, he said the schools, built for orphans, were criticised by a certain school of thought.

The CM said, "Danish schools were set up to empower the less privileged and bring them on a par with the pass-outs of elite grammar schools of the country." He said some sceptics doubt the success of the Daanish schools on financial grounds. He further said that they should not worry, as these schools would generate their own funds like Aitchison College or other private grammar schools.

Shahbaz Sharif said he would establish a system based on justice and equality with equal opportunities for the deprived segments of society.

He said that the Punjab government had founded the Punjab Education Endowment Fund and about 50,000 need-based scholarships were being granted to students. He said that position holders were provided an opportunity to study in great educational institutions of the world and meet great academics, including Nobel laureates, so that they could be inspired to achieve greatness for the country. He urged the students to earn a name for their country, which had been facing many challenges and had lost its sense of glory. He went on to say that electricity and gas worth billions of rupees had been pilfered by some industries, which had promoted unfairness in the country. He expressed the resolve to stamp out all illegal activities.

The CM regretted the fact that the rulers had emptied the national coffer and the nation had been handed a begging bowl in the form of foreign debts.

He said that the nation would have to emulate countries like Germany and Japan, which rose from the ashes and turned defeat into victory. He congratulated the position holders on their glorious achievements and urged them to make the country proud by their services. The CM also invited parliamentarians and journalists to award certificates to position holders. Provincial ministers, including Education Minister Rana Mashood Ahmed, parliamentarians, vice chancellors of public sector universities, eminent journalists, intellectuals, educationists, teachers and a large number of students and their parents were also present on the occasion. app

Denmark has also provided humanitarian assistance to Pakistan during the earthquake in 2005 and during the floods in 2010-12, where Denmark contributed with more than USD 30 million for flood relief response.

Punjab Minister for Education, Sports and Archeology Rana Mashhood Ahmed Khan on Friday said the government was making all-out efforts to improve the existing education system and to increase the literacy rate in Punjab. He said the government has launched the Enrollment Emergency Campaign to increase the enrollment rate, focusing on children unable to get admission in schools due to various reasons. Presiding over a meeting held at Higher Education Commission (HEC) he said, "The main objective of the campaign is to get rid of ignorance and for increased close coordination among concerned departments besides working efficiently to make the drive successful." The meeting was attended by Board of Intermediate and Secondary Education Chairman Dr Muhammad Ashraf, Fatima Jinnah Women University Vice Chancellor Dr Samina Qadir, Executive District Officer (Education) Qazi Zahoor-ul-Haq, Director Colleges Rawalpindi Dr Abdul Qayyum Bhatti, Divisional Sports Officer Shah Manzir Farid and Executive District Officers (Education) from Jhelum, Chakwal and Attock. Rana Mashhood said a complaint cell was being set up to swiftly resolve the problems faced by the education department to help achieve the literacy rate target. He said that he would pay surprise visits to check working of schools, adding that computer labs and video conferencing facilities would also be provided at elementary schools. He also said that public and private partnership would be promoted for the provision of all required facilities at educational institutions. Furthermore, the minister stated that seminars and various walks would be organised jointly by the Education Department, Higher Education Commission and different universities to create awareness about diseases such as Dengue Fever in connection with the Anti-Dengue day being observed on August 18.

### Ban Ki-moon propagates education for all

United Nations Secretary General Ban Ki-moon Tuesday urged Pakistani youth to not to compromise on seeking education, despite threats being posed to the educational institutions. While addressing an event focusing the youth and education at Islamabad College for Girls, he stressed that the right to education should not be for some but for all girls and boys in Pakistan. He maintained that the goal of the United Nations was to provide better schooling and quality education to the children across the globe. "I want all children and young people to have equal learning opportunities. This is why I launched my Global Education First Initiative last year," Ban Ki-moon elaborated. Quoting the founder of the nation Mohammad Ali Jinnah, the UN chief said, "It was Quaid who said that no nation can rise to the height of glory unless your women are side by side with you." Making comparison to the various threats being posed to the schools with his early education Ban Ki-moon said that he grew up in Korea just after the war and like many young people in Pakistan, the then Korea had to struggle for its education. Korean schools had been destroyed and were lacking classroom and relevant supplies. Pointing towards Malala Yusufzai, the Pakistani teen who was recently appointed UN ambassador for education, United Nations secretary general mentioned that Malala's speech was powerful and moving which she delivered at UN General Assembly, adding that Malala was a famous student but she acted like a teacher.

### Overseas Pakistanis to invest in

education sector

LAHORE - Lauding the role of overseas Pakistanis in the nation building, Punjab Governor Ch Muhammad Sarwar on Monday said that their love for the country was unquestionable and their bond with it unbreakable. The overseas Pakistanis said they will fully support and provide all kind of resources for this noble cause. They also congratulated Governor Punjab on assuming his new responsibility and said that his appointment as Governor of Punjab was in fact the voice of all overseas Pakistanis. Governor Punjab said that overseas Pakistanis always stepped forward for the betterment of the country and played a vital role in the difficult times. "They in fact, are the real ambassadors of Pakistan in foreign countries", he added. Governor also stated that illiteracy was the main cause of all problems facing the country and the government will have to overcome these difficulties through strengthening of the education sector. "The fact that about 7 million children are deprived of basic education and are not attending schools is a very grim situation at present", Sarwar remarked, adding that on the direction of the Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif and the Chief Minister Punjab he was preparing a comprehensive plan to send one million children to school for acquiring basic education. Earlier, Inspector General of Police Punjab, Khan Baig called on Governor Punjab at Governor House and briefed him about the law and order situation.

### Salient features - provincial education budget

#### Khyber Pakhtunkhwa

KP's headline announcement of the size of the education plan was Rs 72.7 billion. Of this amount, about 44.7 billion pertains to the education budgets of district/local governments. The 2013-14 share for education is 30 percent higher than actual spending in 2012-13. Greater detail is missing in the KP budget, especially in terms of total distribution for different tiers of education. However, under the head of Development Expenditure, Rs 8.1 billion is due to the primary and secondary levels, and Rs 5.7 billion to higher/tertiary education. Salaries account for 92 percent of the overall allocation for education, with the ratio at 89 percent in the case of primary education.

#### Punjab

Punjab has allocated 15 percent of its total budget outlay for education. However, this total allocation includes health as well as Agriculture Education Rs. 1.8 billion, Arts Colleges Rs 15.6 billion, Archives and Museums Rs 0.27 billion, and Administration Costs Rs 11.1 billion.

#### Sindh

Sindh's allocation for education is Rs 134 billion. Despite the size of the provision, district-wise educational outcomes in Sindh are amongst the lowest in Pakistan. This potentially raises serious concerns regarding the effectiveness of spending. Sindh has earmarked Rs 52 billion for primary education, which represents 38 percent of the total allocation for education. However, it seems that no funds have been made due for primary education in the provincial ADP from its own resources.

#### Balochistan

Balochistan's portion for education in 2013-14 is Rs 35 billion. This represents 21% of the total budget and amounts to a 43 percent increase over actual spending in 2012-13. The allocation for development expenditure (education) is Rs 10.5 billion, as opposed to actual spending of Rs 1.7 billion in 2012-13, representing an increase of more than 600 percent. For current/recurring expenditure on education, 84.2 percent of the amount billed is under the head of salaries (Rs 20.8 billion out of a total of Rs 24.7 billion).

### New Punjab Governor aims to improve education, investments

LAHORE: Punjab Governor Chaudhry Muhammed Sarwar stressed on the importance of increased investors and education in Pakistan on Monday, during a press conference in Lahore.

Investments are down due to lawlessness and terrorism, said Sarwar aiming to improve this situation. Seven million children are out of school in Pakistan, and with the help of Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif and Punjab Chief Minister Shahbaz Sharif, one million children will be put into schools every year, he added.

Having served in British Parliament is not a deterrent, added Sarwar, who gave up his British nationality to become Governor. Sarwar was recommended by the prime minister and appointed

governor by former President Asif Ali Zardari.

The Punjab Education Foundation (PEF) released 10,000 vouchers to deserving students aged between 5 and 16 years in 28 different districts of the province to provide them the opportunity of gratis education under the foundation's Education Voucher Scheme (EVS). Punjab Education Foundation Chairman Raja Anwar stated this while talking to a 20-member delegation of EVS beneficiary students and their parents at his office. While talking to the delegation, Anwar said that the scheme was launched in 2006 with the aim of benefitting children belonging to less affluent and underprivileged areas who could not get an education otherwise, due to financial and social constraints. He said that this scheme received tremendous response due to its beneficial effect on the society's poor segments. "EVS employs innovative techniques to increase enrollment and enhance quality of education," he said. Furthermore, he said that now the total number of EVS beneficiaries had reached 150,000 students in 36 districts of Punjab. He added that the EVS had emerged as a ray of hope for the hopeless because of its effectiveness in redressing the educational problems of the poor strata. At the occasion, the delegation's members thanked Anwar for providing free education to the deserving students through the EVS.

### **KP CM approves wide-ranging educational reforms**

The education working group presented recommendations including viable and practicable proposals for provision of quality education in public sector education institutions, performance-based recognition, peaceful working conditions and environments for the teachers, teachers training, medium of instructions, quality text books and effective curricula. PTI chief Imran Khan, provincial ministers Mohammad Atif, Shahram Khan Tarakai, Habibur Rehman, Shaukat Ali Yousafzai, MNAs, MPAs and other notables were present on the occasion.

### **UAE builds modern school for children in remote Pakistan**

KALAM: The construction of a modern new school is nothing but a miracle for the children in the scenic Swat valley, that only a few years back witnessed military operations and destruction of vital infrastructure. Built along the meandering Swat River at an altitude of around 6300 feet, the two-storey school building constructed with funding from the government of United Arab Emirates houses a computer lab, eight class rooms and administration facilities. Official figures put the total number of schools destroyed in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa at 750 since 2008, due to militant activity and floods, of which 611 have been reconstructed.

For the 10 year old Ayesha and her parents in the remote Kalam village, it is a dream come true, as she can now study and play with her friends, in an attractive building, only 15 minutes walk, across the river through a narrow wooden plank bridge.

The school, around 270 kms drive from Islamabad is home to over 225 young children from nearby homes. It has a fully equipped computer lab, modern teaching facilities and cartoon characters painted on the walls - a welcome difference from the earlier structures that housed schools.

Under the UAE Pakistan Assistance Program the new preparatory Haryati School is part of efforts to boost educational development in the province under the directives and initiatives of President

of UAE Sheikh Khalifa bin Zayed Al Nahyan.

The school was inaugurated by Director General of the UAE Project to Assist Pakistan Abdullah Al Ghafli and Major General Akhtar Jamil, Commander of the GOC 45th Engineers Division of Pakistan Army, unveiled the plaque.

Al Ghafli said the school is part of the 53 educational projects worth AED 27.6 million (Rs 745.3 million), carried out by the UAE Project to Assist Pakistan. The institutes include primary, high schools, degree colleges and vocational training institutes.

He particularly mentioned the initiatives of President Sheikh Khalifa bin Zayed Al Nahyan to boost education in Pakistan and said "students in Pakistan will now be able to receive education - from primary to high school, and even pursue post-high school education at specialised colleges."

He termed it the most important aspect of development of individuals, families and the society at large so as to join the league of developed nations.

Al Ghafli later handed over school bags to the students of the new school, as part of a plan of UAE Project to Assist Pakistan to distribute 30,000 schools bags to poor and orphaned Pakistani male and female school students.

The principal of the new school termed the school a symbol of hope for male and female students from remote Pakistani areas who aspire to receive education in modern schools and to secure a better future for themselves and their families.

The parents beaming with pride and looking forward to a bright future of their children were appreciative of the efforts of President Sheikh Khalifa bin Zayed Al Nahyan for bringing education to their doorsteps.

Following the pushing out of militants from the Swat valley, there has been a gradual increase in enrollment, as the parents now feel it safe to send their children to schools. According to Swat District Education Officer Dilshad Bibi the first six months of 2013, 102,374 girls were registered at different primary schools in Swat.

Provincial Minister for Education Muhammad Atif terming female education a priority said his government has allocated an amount of Rs 66 billion for education, an increase in the annual budget by 27 per cent.

PESHAWAR: Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) Governor Engineer Shaukatullah Khan Tuesday inaugurated Fata Medical and Education Support Program, Geo News reported.

The inaugural ceremony of the scheme, initiated with a view to promote the facilities of education and health, was held in Governor House here. According to sources, a Non-governmental Organisation (NGO) would provide the hospitals in tribal areas with modern equipment while basic facilities for education would be provided to the poor children. An amount of Rs100 million would be spent on the aforementioned projects, the sources added.

LAHORE: Improvements in education sector, increase in allocation for education budget and special efforts from government, society and individuals for promotion of girl's education in Pakistan were amongst the demands made on Malala Day. #### Monsoon 2013 Response updates

More than 1.3 million people have been affected by monsoon floods of which 58 % in Punjab, 36 % are in Sindh and 5 per cent in Balochistan. (OCHA Monsoon update issue : 6)

The monsoon situation has also affected the schools in affected districts , as per initial information 653 schools are affected in five districts of Punjab, DG Khan, (110), Sialkot (59), Rajanpur (148) Multan (141). This damage is currently being verified by education office. Schools are also affected in Sindh, data is also being collected and verified in Sindh.

In total 21,869 children including 10,215 girls have been reached with emergency education response since 2013 in both camp and off camp locations at KP and FATA.

- Gender Marker and Mainstreaming training has taken place at national cluster level and plans are underway to roll-out to provincial clusters.
- Inter-Agency Network for Education in Emergencies (INEE) Mini-mum Standards training has been taken place in KP/FATA in the second week of September.

In Sindh HANDS refurbished 30 schools, minor repair work in 4 schools is in under progress . It has also provided educational supplies to 30 schools, trained 58 teachers and conducted 180 hygiene awareness sessions for 4197 student.

SAFWCO has planned four trainings sessions for 90 teachers in September 2013. It will also provide 2500 student supply packages selected schools and will refurbish 150 rooms in 61 schools.

Meanwhile Education Emergency Response Funded project in Balochistan has been completed by BBSA , 43 schools have been refurbished

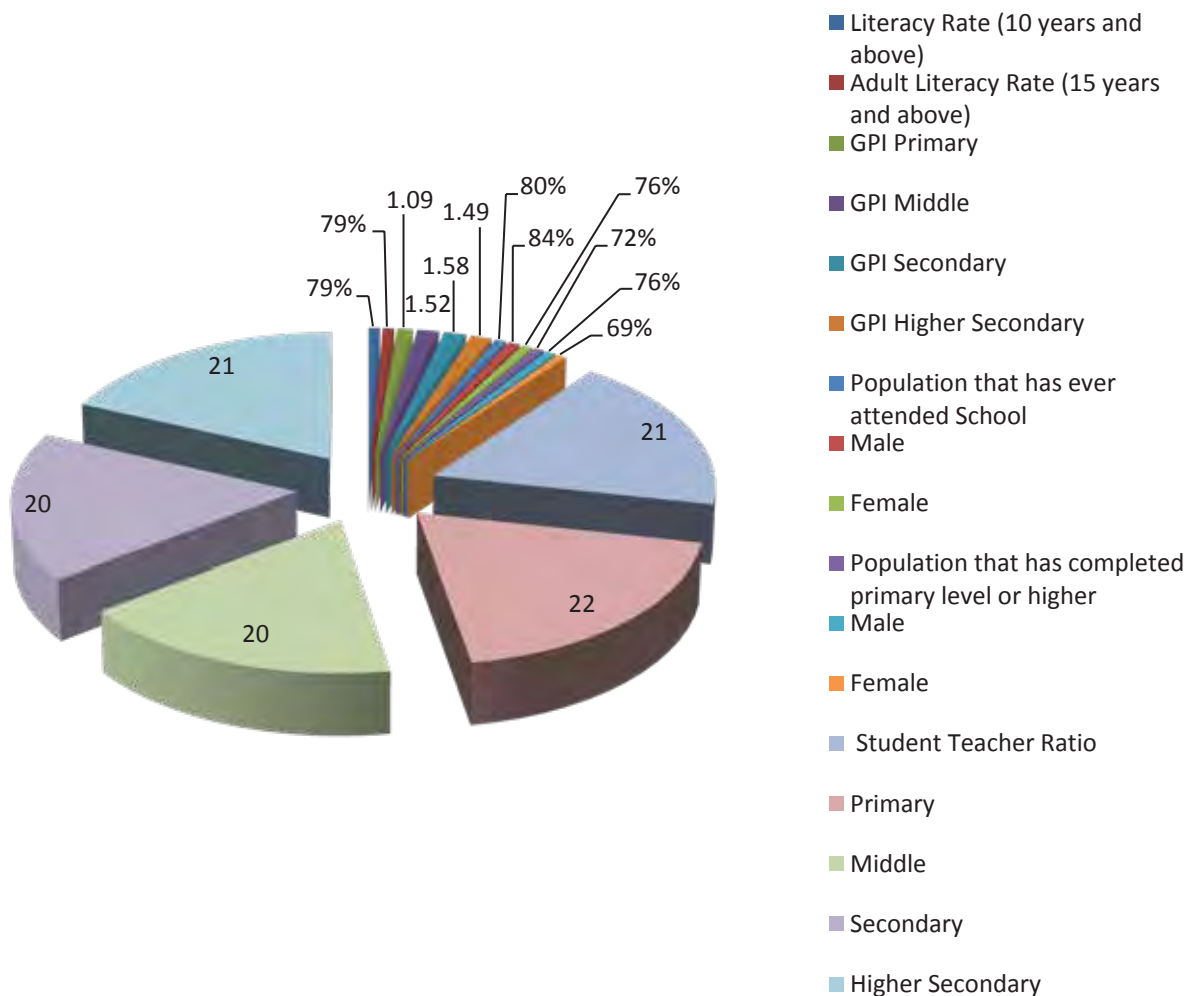

## District Karachi Education Profile

The education status of Karachi is better than other districts in Sindh. It possesses with a large number of institutions (schools, colleges and universities). According to PSLM Survey 2010-11 the overall literacy rate among 10 years and above is 79%. 72% of population has completed the primary and higher level of education which signifies the better level of literacy in the district<sup>1</sup>. Following graph is reflecting the public sector education status of Karachi as reported in Annual School Census 2010-11<sup>2</sup>.



## Enrolment and Educational Facilities by level and Gender

According to Sindh Education Census 2010-11 there are 3,609 number of school facilities with a total enrollment of 567,897. The following graphs illustrated that highest proportion of the enrollment and school facilities are reported at primary schools, which is 2,530 number of schools with 323,154 enrollment. Similarly, the teaching staff at highest proportion is reported at primary level which 14,705. Thus on average each primary school has an enrollment of 128 students with teaching staff of 6.

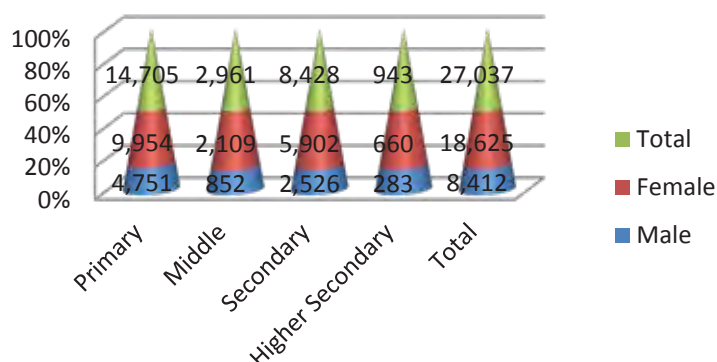

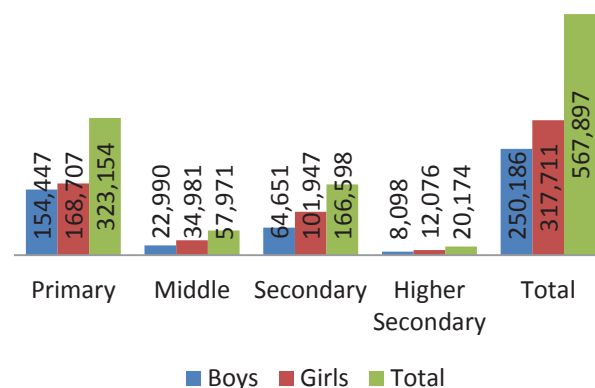

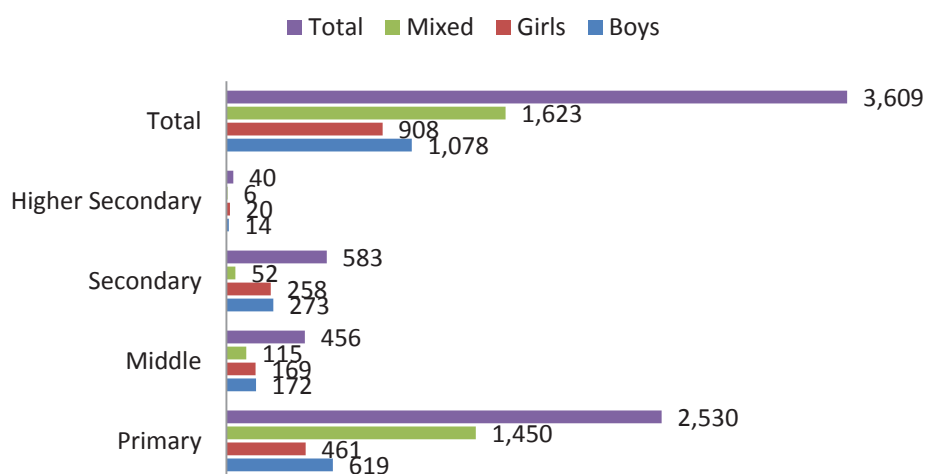
Number of Teachers

## COMMENT : The who, where and why of out of school children

*Roughly one in 10 of the world's primary-age children who are not in school are in Pakistan, thereby placing Pakistan as second in the global OOSC ranking*

Pakistan has the highest proportion of out-of-school children (OOSC) in South Asia. The Pakistan Education Task Force reported in 2011 that roughly one in 10 of the world's primary-age children who are not in school are in Pakistan, thereby placing Pakistan as second in the global OOSC ranking. The Out of School Children study by UNESCO estimates seven million children to be out of school in Pakistan. According to the Pakistan Social and Living Measurement (PSLM) survey 2010-11, although overall enrolment has increased to 98 percent, net enrolment at the primary level is only 61 percent, indicating that 39 percent children of the appropriate age group are not in school. According to The State of Pakistan's Children Report 2012, almost 25 million children and adolescents are out of school in Pakistan, out of which seven million (aged between three and five years) have yet to receive primary schooling. It is evident that Pakistan will not be able to meet the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) target of universal primary education by 2015.

Also, not all children in school complete the primary cycle, thus adding to the out of school children. A breakdown of national data by rural urban categories shows that the majority of out of school children live in rural communities. Another dimension is that of poverty, with children in the lowest income quartile likely to be out of school as shown by the PSLM data. With almost 50 percent girls out of school in rural areas, girls are more likely to be out of school as compared to boys. Furthermore, data collected by UNICEF under the Multiple Cluster Index surveys and other case studies identify children suffering from malnutrition and poor health, orphans, those with special needs, overage and underage children, and certain groups of children defined by disability, ethnicity, language, religion, or caste as mostly being out of school. Children of tribal and nomadic families, with poor access to schools, also fall in the category of out of school children. And child victims of conflict and natural disasters resulting in migration or displacement are adding to the number.

### Why children are out of school: the demand side.

Despite abolition of school fees and provision of free textbooks, factors such as distance of school from the home and cost of additional expenditure (notebooks, stationery, uniforms) on education by families contributes to children remaining out of school. Research on school going children shows a considerable degree of awareness on their part of what a better learning and playing environment constitutes, hence the demand for better schools and education. The data shows that in all provinces of the country there are thousands of schools without sufficient classrooms, no boundary wall or toilets, no provision of drinking water, and with no electricity. In the absence of quality education, parents who endorse the value of quality education for a prosperous future, better job employment, good citizenship, and life skills prefer to withdraw their children from school or not enrol them in the first place.

### Why children are out of school: the supply side.

Although the UPE campaigns may be an effective approach in getting children into school, keeping them there requires a different approach. In the opinion of teachers, income-poverty leading to child labour, parents' ignorance, and students' lack of interest are the common challenges faced by them in ensuring a high enrolment and retention rate. Teachers also tend to hold the education department responsible for not making sufficient effort to improve the chance of every child studying in school by improving school infrastructure and other facilities, especially ensuring an adequate number of qualified teachers in a school. They also cite frequent policy changes such as the teacher and school rationalisation policy of merging single sex schools and introducing English as the medium of instruction, political pressure and undue demands made on them by the department to participate in non-teaching activities as affecting the quality of teaching. However, studies show that teachers are seldom willing to accept their own lack of commitment as a reason for their poor performance and hence the lack of interest on the part of children leading to high school dropout rates.

Thus despite several major government and donor interventions over the last decade including the first Education Sector Reforms Action Plan 2001-2004, the National Education for All (EFA) Plan 2000-2015, more recent provincial education sector reform programmes as well as social safety nets such as the Benazir Income Support Programme and the stipends for girls, the problem of out of school children remains.

It is therefore evident that in order to address the problem of OOSC, key data, analysis and policy gaps need to be identified and addressed. In 2011, UNICEF commissioned a study using international tools and methodologies to identify OOSC, to measure the scope and describe the complexity of exclusion and disparities, to assess the reasons for exclusion, and to inform policy and planning. This study conducted by the Lahore University of Management Sciences (LUMS) and the Society for the Advancement of Education (SAHE) used a range of existing data collected through administrative records and household surveys. It developed profiles of OOSC and the multiple and overlapping forms of exclusion and disparities that affect them. A systematic analysis of the barriers and bottlenecks to reach underserved populations was carried out so that policies and programmes to address the problem of OOSC and reduce inequalities could be targeted towards specific groups, provinces and districts.

It remains unclear as to whether this study has informed the most recent exercise on finalising provincial education sector plans. Its findings can be extremely useful in helping to operationalise the state's mandate to 'remove illiteracy and provide free and compulsory primary and secondary education within a minimum possible period' and its constitutional obligation of the right to education under Article 25.

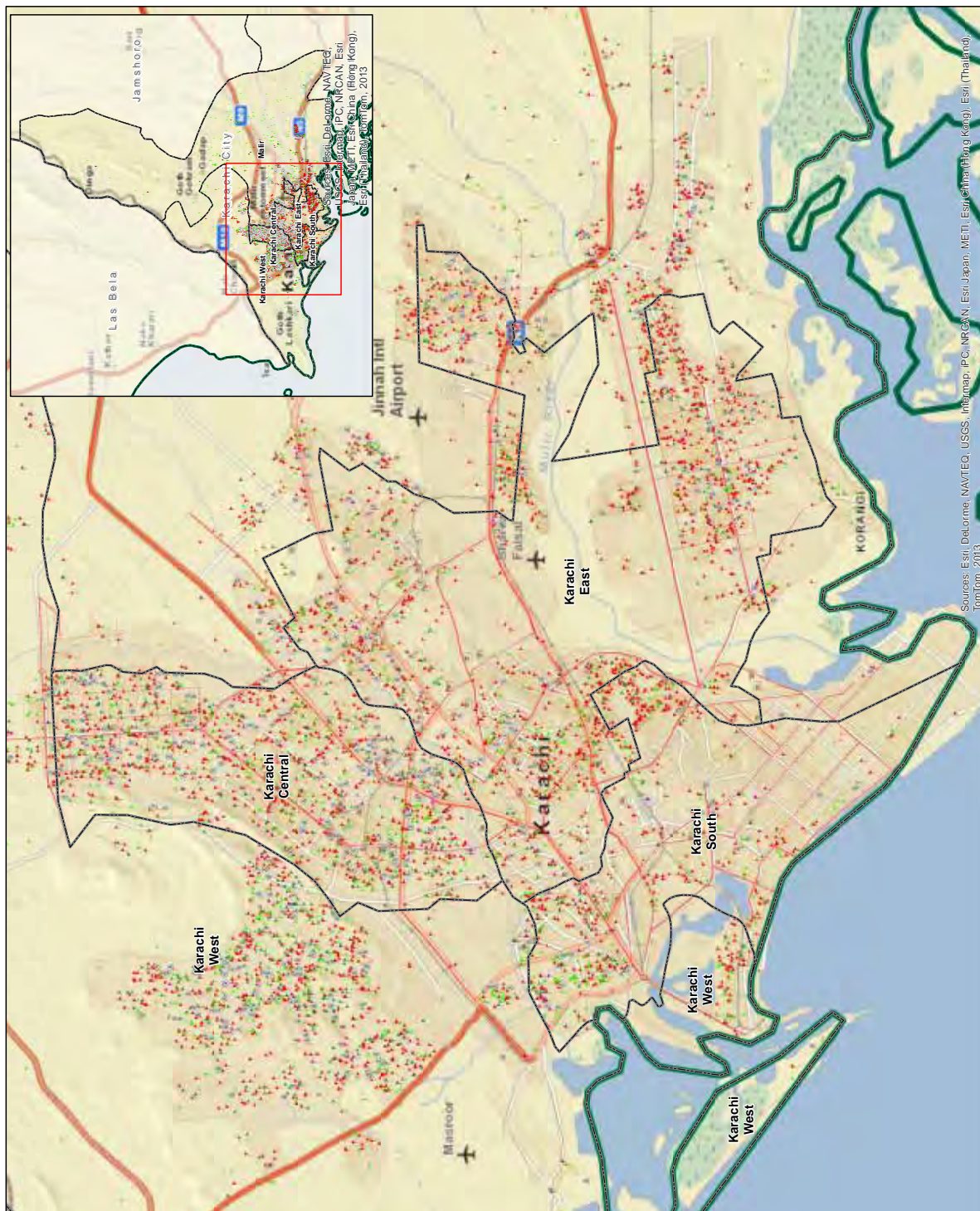

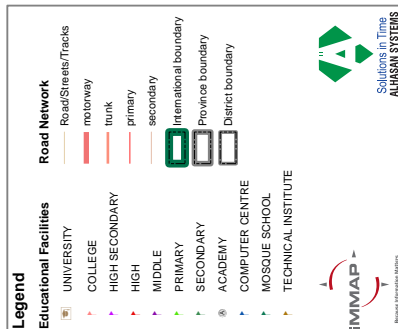


## KARACHI CITY, SINDH - EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES MAP

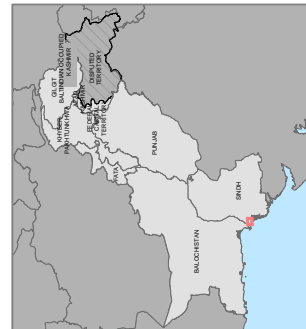

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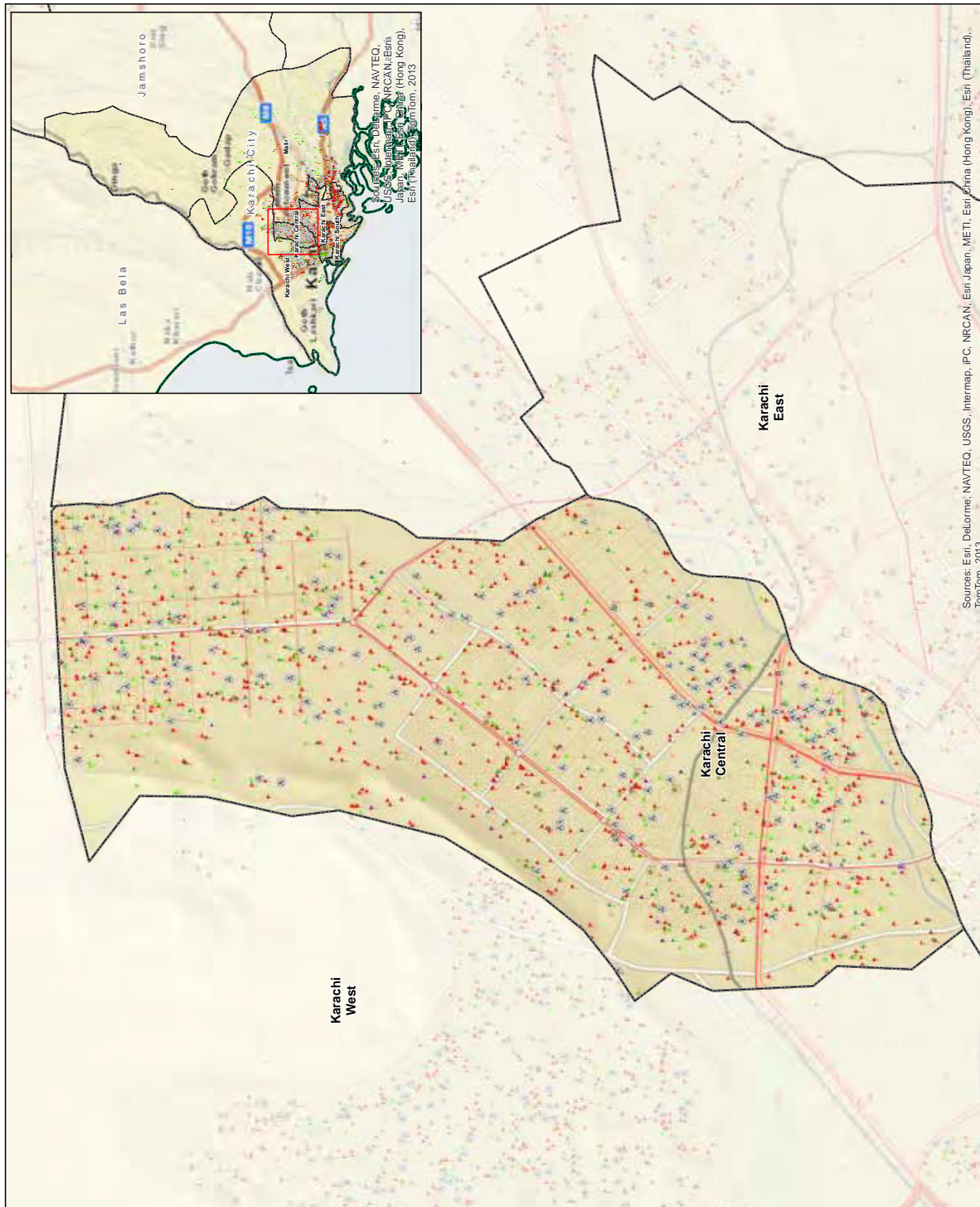
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## KARACHI CENTRAL, SINDH - EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES MAP
